INVESTITURE OF HIS MAJESTY THE EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA, KING OF HUNGARY AND OF BOHEMIA, WITH THE ENSIGNS AND HABIT OF THE MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE GARTER.

Vienna, July 25, 1867.

THE Queen, Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, having been pleased by a Commission under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, to constitute and appoint The Most Honourable John Alexander, Marquess of Bath, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, on a Special Mission to this Court, and Sir Charles George Young, Knt., Garter Principal King of Arms, to be Her Majesty's Plenipotentiaries for Investing His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty with the Ensigns and Habit of that Most Noble Order, they proceeded to this City and arrived with their respective Suites on the 23d instant.

On the following day The Marquess of Bath was honoured with an audience of His Imperial Majesty, at the Burg Palace, after which Garter and the Members of the respective Suites were severally presented to His Majesty.

The requisite arrangements for the Investiture having been made, His Imperial Majesty was pleased to appoint Thursday the 25th instant for that purpose, on which day, at half-past twelve o'clock, the several persons appointed to take part in the Ceremony assembled at the Hotel of Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, and from thence proceeded to the Palace in four Royal State Carriages.

The Mission, preceded by two Fourriers of the Court, was received at the Ambassador's Entrance of the Palace by a Military Guard, and was conducted to the Imperial Apartments, and from thence to the Royal Ante-Chamber, where it was received by the Grand Master of the Ceremonies, the Landgrave Fürstenberg, and, passing to the second Ante-Chamber, it was received by the Grand Chamberlain, Le Comte F. Folliot de Crenneville, and several others of the Imperial Chamberlains.

The Mission then advanced to the Grand Council Room into the presence of His Imperial Majesty, in the following order; the Insignia of the Order being carried on Velvet Cushions:—

Alfred Guthrie Graham Bonar, Esq., Secretary to the British Embassy, carrying the Star.

Major-General The Right Honourable Sir Henry K. Storks, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., carrying the Sword.

Colonel the Honourable Percy R. Basil Feilding, carrying the Mantle and Cordon of the Order.

Bertram Ashburnham, Esq., commonly called Viscount St. Asaph, carrying the Collar of the Order.

Earl Brownlow, carrying the Hat and Plume.



James Robinson Planché, Esq., Somerset Herald, in his Tabard and Collar of S.Ş., bearing The Garter and the Riband and George.

Albert William Woods, Esq., Lancaster Herald, Secretary to the Garter Mission, in his Tabard and Collar of S.S., carrying the Commission.

Sir Charles George Young, Knight, Garter King of Arms, wearing his Mantle, Chain and Badge, carrying his Sceptre and The Sovereign's Letter of Credence. Armar Henry Lowry-Corry, Esq., Secretary to the Special Mission, carrying the Book of the Statutes.

The Most Honourable John Alexander, Marquess of Bath, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, on a Special Mission.

The Gentlemen bearing the Insignia arranged themselves behind the Plenipotentiaries, the Secretary to the Mission remaining near to the Plenipotentiaries, to deliver to them the Insignia

The First Plenipotentiary, the Marquess of Bath, then made an Address to His Imperial Majesty, declaratory of the object of the Mission, to which His Imperial Majesty graciously replied, and expressed his gratification at the reception of the Order; Garter then delivered to His Lordship the Letter of Credence, which his Lordship presented to the Emperor, who placed the same in the hands of Baron de Beust, Minister President; the Statutes were then in like manner presented to the Emperor, and next the Commission, both of which were delivered by His Imperial Majesty to Baron Beust, by whom the latter was subsequently returned to Garter.

Garter then taking the Garter, delivered it to the Marquess of Bath, who buckled the same around His Imperial Majesty's left leg; Garter reading the admonition.

His Imperial Majesty was next invested with the Riband and George appendant; Garter reading the admonition.

The Emperor then delivered his Sword, which Garter received and retained as an ancient Re appertaining to his office; and His Imperial Majesty was invested with the Sword of the Order.

His Imperial Majesty being then divested of the Riband and George, which was received an Officer of the Court, Garter presented to the Marquess of Bath the Mantle with which is Imperial Majesty was invested by the Plenipotentiaries.

His Imperial Majesty was, in like manner, invested with the Collar; Garter then delivered to the Marquess of Bath the Hat and Feathers, which were presented by His Lordship to the Empero, and His Lordship immediately after delivered the Star of the Order to His Imperial Majesty.

The Ceremony of the Investiture being completed, the Plenipotentiaries, with their respective Suites, making their reverences, withdrew from the Imperial presence.

In the afternoon a splendid Banquet was given by His Imperial Majesty, at Schönbrum Palace, at which the Plenipotentiaries and their Suites, the Ministers of State, the Grand Officer of the Court, as also Lord Bloomfield, G.C.B., Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Court of Vienna, and the Secretaries of the Embassy were present. His Imperial Majesty appeared wearing the Star of the Order.

In a circle, after the Banquet, the Plenipotentiaries and their Suites took leave of His Imperial Majesty.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, July 31, 1867.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, an extract from the French Moniteur, containing a Decree dated 17th July 1867, promulgating a Law respecting the commercial system of Algeria, of which the following is a translation:—

PART I.

INTERCOURSE WITH FRANCE.

ART I. The raw or manufactured native products of Algeria imported direct into French ports will be admitted duty free. This freedom is to apply equally to foreign products imported from Algeria into France, which have been naturalized on entering Algeria by the payment of the full amount of duty, as specified in Table C, annexed to this Law.

Foreign products imported from Algeria into France, which have paid the duties specified in Tables A and B, shall be admitted into France only on condition of paying the difference between the tariff of Algeria and that of France.

ART. 2. The raw or manufactured products of France (with the exception of sugars), and foreign products naturalized by the payment of duties on being imported direct into the ports of Algeria, will be admitted free.

ART. 3. The exceptions from freedom from the duties laid down either in the general tariff or in the conventional tariffs, shall not apply to exports from Algeria to France or from France to Algeria.

PART II.

FOREIGN TRADE.

I.—Imports by Sea.

ART. 4. Foreign products not included in the Table A, B, and C, annexed, will be admitted duty free in the ports of Algeria.

ART. 5. Conformably to the proviso in Art. 4, foreign products will pay—namely, those enumerated in Table A, the duties fixed by the said Table; products enumerated in Table B, a third of the duties fixed by the general French tariff or by the conventional tariffs; and those enumerated in Table C, the whole of the duties. In the two last cases, the importer shall have the choice of either the general tariff or of the conventional tariffs.

Products prohibited by the general tariff, according as they are included in Table B or C, will be admitted, without distinction of origin, on payment of a third of the whole of the duties laid down in the conventional tariffs.

2.—Imports by the Land Frontiers.

ART. 6. Foreign products imported into Algeria by the land frontiers, will be subject to the regulations established by Table D, annexed.

ART. 7. Merchandize exported from Algeria for foreign countries will be subject to the same regulations as if exported from France.

PART III.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

ART. 8. The nomenclature of Tables A, B, C. and D, annexed, may be modified by Decrees of the Emperor. These Decrees must be converted into Projects of Law, and submitted, in the course

of a year, for the sanction of the Legislative Assembly.

ART. 9. The Laws, Ordinances, Decrees, and Rules applicable to the affairs of the Imperial Customs shall apply equally to Algeria, in so far as they are not at variance with the provisions of the present Law.
