WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the thirty-first day of August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, the Lords of Her Majesty's Council did, among other things, order that from and after the third day of September one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it should not be lawful for any person to remove cattle or other animals from any port or place in England and Wales to any port or place in Scotland :

And whereas provisions have been subsequently made by the Lords of the said Council authorizing the admission, under certain restrictions, of sheep into Scotland, by divers Orders dated respectively the tenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which related to the movement of rams from the county of Northumberland into Scotland, the second day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which extended the provisions of such last-named Order to sheep and lambs, the thirtieth day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which related to the movement of cattle and other animals from the counties of Northumberland and Cumberland into Scotland, and the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, which related to the movement of cattle and other animals from the county of Westmorland into Scotland :

And whereas it is expedient that the restrictions on the movement of sheep into Scotland from England and Wales should be rescinded :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows :—

1. So much of the said Order of the thirty-first day of August one thousand eight hundred and

sixty-six, as prevents the movement of sheep from any port or place in England or Wales into any port or place in Scotland is hereby rescinded.

2. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order issued by the Lords of the said Council under the Act aforesaid, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

3. The word "sheep," for the purpose of this Order, shall also include rams and lambs.

Naples, July 31, 1867.

I HAVE the honour to report to your Lordship that in consequence of the appearance of cholera in the province of Cosenza, Calabria Citeriore, a quarantine of fifteen days has been imposed on vessels arriving from all the ports and places situated on the eastern coast of that province between Roseto and Cariati.

A quarantine of seven days has also been imposed on vessels from Leghorn which sailed on or after the 30th instant.

The Vic -Consul at Gioja Tauro, in Calabria Ulteriore I^e, reports the appearance of cholera in the vicinity of Bagnara.

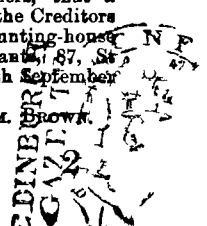
