HIS day the Lords being met, ames age was fent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Uther of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorifed by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal affent to feveral acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal affent to the faid acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal affent given to

An act for continuing and granting to his Majesty certain duties upon malt, mum, cyder, and perry, for the fervice of the year one thousand eight hundred and

An act for continuing and granting to his Majesty a duty on pentions, offices, and perfonal eftates, in England, Wales, and the town of Berw ck-upon-Tweed, and certain duties on fugar, malt, tobacco, and fugar feeth of feeth of the state and fouff, for the fervice of the year one thousand eight hundred and one.

An act for suspending, until the twentieth day of August one thousand eight hundred and one, the du-ties on hops imported, and for charging other duties in lieu thereof

An act to prohibit, until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and two, the use of corn in diffilling of fpirits or making of ftarch.

An act for continuing, until the expiration of forty days after the commencement of the first session of Parliament that shall be begun and holden after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and one, feveral laws relating to the prohibiting the exportation and permitting the importation of corn and other articles of provision, without payment of dury, to the allowing fugar in the brewing of beer, to the reducing the duties upon spirits distilled from molasses and fugar, and to the prohibiting the making of low wines or spirits from wheat and certain other articles, in that part of Great Britain called Scotland.
