WHITEHALL, January 7, 1868.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Richard Edwards, of Moreton, in the county palatine of Lancaster, Clerk, Vicar of Mytton, in the West Riding of the county of York, and unto Betty Edwards, his wife, fourth but eldest surviving child and co-heir of John Pilling, late of Baxenden, in the said county palatine, Gentleman, and of Jennett, his wife, sister of James Taylor, late of Whalley, in the aforesaid county palatine of Lancaster, Esquire, all deceased, Her Royal licence and authority that they and their issue may, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of the said James Taylor, (the maternal uncle of the said Betty Edwards,) take and henceforth use the surname of Taylor in addition to and after that of Edwards:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none effect.

By virtue of an Act passed in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of two Acts made in the tenth and fifteenth years of the reign of His present Majesty as authorizes the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown for making out writs for the election of Members to serve in Parliament, in the manner therein mentioned, and for substituting other provisions for the like purposes;" and of an Act passed in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to further limit and define the time for proceeding to Election during the Recess:"

I do hereby give notice that the death of James Mackie, Esq., late a Member serving in this

present Parliament for the stewardry of Kirkcudbright, hath been certified to me in writing, under the hands of two Members serving in this present Parliament, and that I shall issue my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to make out a new writ for the electing of a Member to serve in this present Parliament for the said stewardry, at the end of six days after the insertion of this notice in the London Gazette.

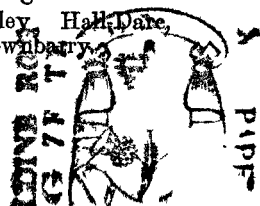

*Board of Trade, Whitehall,

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following Ordinance of the Hamburg Senate, renewing the present Customs Duties for one year, and altering the regulations as to goods in transit:—

The Senate has, in concert with the Burgeship, resolved, and hereby proclaims the following as a law:—

The existing legal enactments as to the Customs Duties, &c., are, with the alterations to take effect on the 1st January 1868, prolonged until the end of the year 1868.

Sections 10 and 32 of the Customs Ordinance are henceforth to run as follows:—

SEC. 10. Every one who carries on business here on his own account may declare goods in transit, if he has previously entered his signature in the book kept at the Chief Custom-house for Declarations in Transit, and has fulfilled the undermentioned conditions, viz:—

1. Citizens of Hamburg must produce their certificates of citizenship at the Chief Custom-house.

2. Every one who has not acquired the right of Hamburg citizenship, whether he is a subject of Hamburg or not, must first pay a duty of 25 marks courant to the Finance Deputation, and also make a deposit of 1000 marks banco with the Finance Deputation, or give such a personal security for that sum as may appear sufficient to the section for Customs and Excise, and must prove at the Chief Custom-house that these conditions have been fulfilled; and further, if he is not a citizen, he must by his signature submit himself to the officers of the City in case of investigation or penalties on account of his Customs or Transit Declarations.

SEC. 32. Every one is authorised to make a Customs Declaration who carries on business here on his own account, and has by his signature submitted himself to the officers of the City in case of investigation or penalties on account of his Customs Declarations.

SCOTLAND.—WEST COAST.—RIVER CLYDE.

Fixed Light off Garvel Point.

The Commissioners of Northern Lights have given notice that, from the 23d day of December 1867, a light has been exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected off Garvel Point (East Greenock), in the River Clyde.

The light is a *fixed red* light, elevated 25 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 7 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The light is placed near the South edge of the Channel, at the bend, off Garvel Point, and bears from the light on the Steamboat Quay in front of the Custom-House at Greenock, S.E. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., and from Garvel House N.N.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., distant 280 yards.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation 25° Westerly, in 1868.]

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 2.)—RED SEA.—WESTERN COAST.

Shoal reported near Gurb Miune Island.

Information has been given by the Master of the Steamship *Great Victoria*, that on two different voyages in the Red Sea he has seen a shoal, not hitherto marked in the Charts, lying about 3 miles E. by N. from Gurb Miune Island, and with that island in a line with Miune Island (2 miles to the westward).

On the second occasion of Mr Enright sighting the shoal, the sea broke heavily over it, and a strong wind prevented close examination.

By the bearing and distance from Gurb Miune Island above given, the position of the shoal would be in lat. 18° 32' N., long. 38° 53' East of Greenwich.

It will be observed that this reported shoal is in close proximity to a group of low sandy islands and shoals bordering the western coast of the Red Sea, and a considerable distance from the fairway track up and down the sea. Mariners are cautioned accordingly.
