BY THE KING-A PROCLAMATION, Declaring what Enfign or Colours shall be borne at Sea, in merchant ships or vessels belonging to any of his Majesty's subjects of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the dominions thereunto belonging.

Whereas, by the first article of the articles of Union of the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, as the fame have been ratified and confirmed by two acts of Parliament, the one made in our Parliament of Great Britain, and the other in our Parliament of Ireland, it was pro with the advice of our Privy Council here vided that the enfigns armorial, flags, and by strictly charge and command all our subbanners of our united kingdom of Great jects whatsoever, that they do not presume to Britain and Ireland should be such as we wear in any of their ships or vessels, our jack, should appoint by our royal proclamation called the Union Jack, nor any pendants, under the great seal of our faid united king-nor any such colours as are usually borne by flould appoint by our royal proclamation under the great feal of our faid united kingdom: And whereas we have, by our royal dom: And whereas we have, by our royal our ships, without particular warrant for proclamation dated this day, appointed and their so doing from us, or our High Admideclared that the arms, or enfigns armorial of the faid united kingdom, should be as therein expressed: And whereas, according for the time being: And we do hereby alto ancient usage, the enfigns, flags, jacks, fo further command all our loving subjects, and pendants worn by our ships, and ap-pointed as a distinction for the same, ought presume not to wear on board their ships or not to be worn on board any ship or vessel vessels any slags, jacks, pendants, or colours, belonging to any of our subjects, so that made in imitation of, or resembling ours, or our ships, and those of our subjects, may be easily distinguished and known, we have, therefore, thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to order and appoint the enfign described on the side or margin hereof to be worn on board all ships

subjects, whether employed in our service our navy, the commissioners for our custor otherwise, and all other persons whom toms and excise, and the commissioners for it may concern, to wear the faid enfign on poard their ships or vessels: And to the end that none of our subjects may presume, on board their ships, to wear our slags, jacks, and pendants, which, according to ancient usage, have been appointed as a distinction to our ships, or any flags, jacks, or pendants in shape and mixture of colours fo far resembling ours as not to be eafily diftinguished therefrom, we do, with the advice of our Privy Council here ral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral made in imitation of, or refembling ours, or any kind of pendant whatfoever, or any other enfigu than the enfigu described on the fide or margin hereof, which shall be worn instead of the ensign before this time

thips and veffels belonging to any of our ordnance, the commissioners for victualling transportation for our service relating particularly to those offices, our royal will and pleasure is, that all such ships as have commissions of letters of mart or reprisals shall, besides the colours or ensign hereby appointed to be worn by merchant ships, wear a red jack with a union jack described in a canton at the upper corner thereof, next the staff; and that such ships and vessels as shall be employed for our service by the principal officers and commissioners of our navy, the principal officers of our ordnance, the commissioners for victualling our navy, the commissioners for our customs and excife, and the commissioners for transportation for our fervice relating particularly to those offices, shall wear a red jack with a union jack in a canton at the upper corner thereof, next the staff as aforelaid, and in the other part of the faid jack shall be de-fcribed the seal used in such of the respective offices aforesaid, by which the said ships and vessels shall be employed: And we do firifly charge and command, that none of our loving subjects do presume to wear any of the said distinction-jacks, unless they shall have commissions of letters of mary or reprifals, or be employed in our fervice by any of the before mentioned officers: And we hereby require our High Admiral usually worn in merchant ships; saving that and Commissioners for executing the office for the better distinction of such ships as of High Admiral, the Governors of our margin hereof to be worn on board all thips for the better diffinction of luch thips as of refels belonging to any of our fubjects what foever, and to iffue this our royal proclamation to notify the fame to all our loving fubjects, hereby strictly charging and commanding the masters of all merchant or reprifals against the enemy, and any other ships or vessels which may be employed by the principal officers and commission their ships or vessels which may be employed by the principal officers and commission their ships or vessels belonging to any of our ships, for the time being, upon their meeting with or otherwise observing any ships or vessels belonging to any of our subjects, neglecting to wear the enfign or wearing any flag, pendant, jack, or enfign contrary hereunto, whether at fea or in port, not only to feize, or cause to be forthwith feized, fuch flag, pendant, jack, or enfign, worn contrary to our royal will and pleasure herein expressed, but also to return the names of such ships and vessels neglecting to wear the enfign hereby appointed, or wearing any flag, pendant, jack, or enfign, contrary hereunto, together with the names of their respecting masters or commanders unto our High Admiral or Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral, or the Judge of our High Court of Admiralty, for the time being, to the end that all persons offending may be And we do duly punished for the same. hereby command and enjoin the Judge and Judges of our High Court of Admiralty for the time being, that they make strict inquiry concerning all fuch offenders, and cause them to be duly punished; and all Vice-Admirals and Judges of the Vice-Admiral-ties, are hereby allo required to proceed in the like manner, within the feveral ports and places belonging to their respective precincts. And our further pleasure is, that this proclamation shall take place according to the times hereafter mentioned, videlicet, for all ships in the Channel or British seas, and in the North Seas, after twelve days from the date of these presents; and from the mouth of the Channel unto Cape St Vincent, after fix weeks from the date of these presents; and beyond the Cape, and on this side the Equinoctial Line, as well in the ocean and Mediterranean as elsewhere, after ten weeks from the date of these prefents, and beyond the Line after the space of eight months from the date of these pre-
