The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Minister at Buenos Ayres, copy of a Decree issued by the Government of the Argentine Confederation on the 2d November last to the following effect:—

In pursuance of the authority given to the Executive, by the law of the National Congress of the 7th September, to apply the sum of 8,000 hard dollars (£1,600) to a prize to be given to the inventor or introducer of the system for preserving fresh meat, best adapted, in the judgment of the Executive, to its working on a large scale, the President of the Republic decrees that a term of six months is fixed, reckoned from this date, in order that those who shall consider themselves in a position to compete for this prize may present their proposals within that time to the Ministry, to be examined in the way the Government may think fit.
