PRESENT,

Lord Northbrook. Mr Hamilton.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The' Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:-

Preliminary.

1. This Order extends to Great Britain only; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August 1869.

Milch Cows in Vessels.

2. Article 5 of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August 1869, shall not apply to any milch cow brought from a port of any of the countries comprised in the Schedule to that Order, provided the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs are, on each occasion of the same being so brought, satisfied that the same has been taken from Great Britain to that port, and has not been landed at that port, or at any other port of any of those countries; and in relation to the landing, on any occasion, of any such milch cow in Great Britain elsewhere than at a part of a port defined as a landing-place for slaughter, the condition secondly stated in Article 6 of the said Order, to the effect that the vessel has not, since taking on board the cattle imported, entered any port of any of the countries aforesaid, shall not operate, provided the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs are on each occasion satisfied as aforesaid; but, subject to the foregoing excep-tion, all the provisions of Articles 6 and 7 of the said Order shall on each occasion apply to every such cow, and the landing thereof, and the vessel bringing the same.

Landing-places for Slaughter.

3. Where, by any Order of Council, the regulations contained in the Fourth Schedule to The Contagious Diseases (Animals.) Act, 1869, or any

At the Council-Chamber, Whitehall, the 1st day of them, have been applied, with any exception or modification, to any foreign cattle, every such exception or modification (as well as the regula-tions or regulation so applied) shall extend and apply to all other kinds of foreign animals for the time being within the same defined part of a port, so that all kinds of foreign animals for the time being within the same defined part shall be subject to the same regulations.

4. Where Regulation 6 of the Fourth Schedule to The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, is in operation, the Local Authority, and all constables and police officers, shall enforce the same, and do or cause to be done all things from time to time necessary for securing as far as may be the effectual isolation of the defined part of the port in respect of the movement of foreign animals.

Port of London.

5. The Order of Council of the tenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, defining the parts of the Port of London within which foreign cattle may be landed for slaughter, shall be read and have effect as if, in the paragraph thereof defining the landing-place, (No. 1.) an Order of Council of the eleventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixtyseven, instead of the eleventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, had been referred to.

TREASURY WARRANT.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon or in respect of letters and newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the trans- | force and effect.

And the undermentioned Officers have been | mission of such letters and papers by the post; and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

> An whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in them in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, have from time to time, by divers Warrants under their hands, authorised and directed that packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, or of printed papers, or of patterns or samples of merchandize, might be transmitted by the post between Her Majesty's colonies and possessions, and also between Her Majesty's colonies and possessions and certain foreign countries, at certain rates of postage, and under and subject to certain conditions, regula-tions, and restrictions, in and by the said several Warrants respectively specified and mentioned.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the postage now chargeable on certain of the several packets transmitted as hereinbefore respectively mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, (by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided,) order, direct, and declare as follows, that is to say :-

- 1. In all cases where packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, or of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, or of printed papers, or of patterns or samples of merchandize, transmitted by the post through the United Kingdom between any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions, or between any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions and any foreign country, under the authority of any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury now in force, are subject to a combined rate or rates of postage, which includes or include two British inland rates for their transmission through the United Kingdom, all such packets respectively shall henceforth be chargeable according to the weight thereof, with one penny per rate less than such combined rate or rates now payable for such transmission through the United Kingdom.
 - 2. All such packets as are mentioned in this Warrant shall remain subject in every respect (save as in this Warrant mentioned) to the several orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions now in force and applicable thereto, and the several Warrants hereinbefore referred to shall (save in so far as the same are respectively altered or affected by this present Warrant) continue in full

- 3. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, revoke, or modify the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof.
- 4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.
