"The Bankruptcy Act, 1869."

James Bacon, Esq., one of the present Commissioners of the London Bankruptcy Court, has been chosen by Her Majesty to be the Chief Judge in Bankruptcy.

*Board of Trade, Whitehall,

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Washington, enclosing the following further Proclamation, which has been issued by the President of the United States, relative to the abolition of discriminating duties between France and the United States :

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the Proclamation of the President of the United States of the 12th day of June last, the levying of discriminating duties on merchandize imported into the United States in French vessels from the countries of its origin was discontinued :

And whereas satisfactory information has since been received by me that the levying of such duties on all merchandize imported into France in vessels of the United States, whether from the countries of its origin or from other countries, has been discontinued :

Now therefore I, U. S. Grant, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by an Act of Congress of the 7th day of January 1824, and by an Act in addition thereto of the 24th of May 1828, do hereby declare and proclaim that on and after this date, so long as merchandize imported into France in vessels of the United States, whether from the countries of its origin or from other countries, shall be admitted into the ports of France on the terms aforesaid, the discriminating duties heretofore levied upon merchandize imported into the United States in French vessels, either from the countries of its origin or from any other country, shall be, and are discontinued and abolished.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this 20th day of November, in the year of our Lord 1869, and of the Independence of the United States of America the ninety-fourth.
