REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE LEVEE
AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command that no presentations shall be made at Levees except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having Petitions or Addresses to present to The Queen at Her Majesty's Levee, are to deliver a card (having on it their names, a statement of the

object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come,) to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days previous to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen; and on these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed Four persons.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 25.)—GULF OF BENGAL.—GULF OF MARTABAN.

Lights on the Coast of British Burmah.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 10, dated 26th January 1869, respecting the establishment of lights on the coast of British Burmah:—

The Government of India has given further Notice that, from the 15th day of September 1869,

the lights from the following lighthouses would be exhibited; and, on the 21st, the light vessel at the entrance of Rangoon River would be removed.

Fixed Light on Krishna Shoal.

The light exhibited from the screw-pile lighthouse, in three fathoms at low water, on the south-eastern edge of the Krishna Shoal, is a *fixed* white light, visible from E.N.E. round by north and west to S.S.W., elevated 60 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the second order.

Position of the lighthouse, lat. 15° 36' 30" N., long. 95° 35' East from Greenwich.

In foggy weather a bell will be sounded *every half-minute*.

NOTE.—This light is intended to enable vessels to avoid the danger of the Baragou Flat and Krishna Shoal; in approaching from the westward a vessel should keep in not less than 7 fathoms, until the light bears N.W., and then shape a course N.E. by N., or N.E. (according to set of tide), for China Buckeer light. Vessels from the northward must not get into less than 6 fathoms, or bring the light to bear southward of S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

No vessel should approach within five miles of the lighthouse.

Revolving Light at China Buckeer.

The light from the screw pile lighthouse, about 3 miles north-east from the mouth of the Buckeer River, is a *revolving* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy *every minute*, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the first order.

The tower is situated on the land of China Buckeer, close to high-water mark; the lower part of the tower, seen against the dark trees, is painted white; it is in lat. 16° 19' 30" N., long. 96° 12' E.

Fixed Light at Eastern Grove.

The light from the screw pile lighthouse, near Eastern Grove, east side of the entrance of Rangoon River, is a *fixed* light, visible between the bearings North and N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., having a more intense light visible 5 degrees on either side of the position of the light-vessel, the centre bearing N.N.E. $\frac{2}{3}$ E.; in clear weather the more intense light should be seen from a distance of 16 miles, and the other 12 miles.

Position of the tower, lat. 16° 29' N., long. 96° 26' 30" East.

Directions.—Steer so as to make China Buckeer light between the bearings of N. by E. and W. by N., and when Eastern Grove light bears N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., the China Buckeer light may be brought to bear West, which position is on the pilot station. Vessels should anchor until daylight or until a pilot is obtained.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation 2° Easterly in 1870.

(No. 26.)—MEDITERRANEAN.—EGYPT.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 90, dated 22d November 1869, respecting the erection of lighthouses at Rosetta, Damietta, and Brulos:—

The Egyptian Government has given Notice that, from the 1st day of May 1870, lights will be exhibited from them as follows:—

Revolving Light at Rosetta.

The light will be a *revolving* light, showing a *red and white* face alternately, at intervals of *six seconds*, elevated 175 feet above the level of the sea.

The illuminating apparatus is of the second class.

The lantern, painted black, is supported on three iron columns, painted white. Position lat. 31° 29' 30" N., long. 30° 19' East from Greenwich.

Mariners are cautioned not to approach this light too closely, as the sands extend two miles northward from it, and an indraught is occasionally experienced.

Fixed Light at Brulos.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, elevated 176 feet above the sea.

The illuminating apparatus is of the first class.

The lantern, painted red, is supported on three iron columns, which are painted as follows, centre column, red; eastern column, white; western column, black.

Position, lat. 31° 36' N., long. 31° 9' E.

Revolving Light at Damietta.

The light will be a *revolving* white light, attaining its greatest brilliancy *every minute*, elevated 176 feet above the sea.

The illuminating apparatus is of the second class.

The lantern, painted white, is supported on three iron columns, painted in alternate black and white horizontal bands, 10 feet wide.

Position, lat. 31° 31' 30" N., long. 31° 61' E.

Mariners are cautioned not to approach this light too closely, as the sands extend two miles north-eastward from it, and an indraught is occasionally experienced.

Flashing Light at Port Said.

Also, that the new light at Port Said is a *flashing* light, flashing *every three seconds*.

The illuminating apparatus is electric, of the first class.

The tower is built of cement and sand, of a light grey colour.
