#### TREASURY WARRANT.

Whereas by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office.

And whereas an additional Convention hath been lately entered into between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of the French, for improving the postal service between their respective dominions, and it is expedient for the better carrying out of the same that certain regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, that is to say:—

1. Every letter posted in any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the schedule hereunder written, addressed to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of such schedule, may be transmitted by the post from any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said schedule to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of such schedule, by the several routes and means of conveyance described and set forth in the third column of such schedule, and in respect of such transmission as aforesaid, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, on every such letter, according to the weight thereof respectively, the several and respective rates of postage applicable thereto, as are specified in the said schedule.

2. If any letter transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant shall be posted in the United Kingdom or Malta addressed to France or Algeria, or shall be posted in France or Algeria addressed to the United Kingdom or Malta, or shall be posted in the United Kingdom or Malta addressed to any place in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Post-offices, or to Tunis or Tangier, or shall be posted in any place in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt at which France maintains Post-offices, or in Tunis or Tangier addressed to the United Kingdom or Malta, the transmission between the United Kingdom and any of such places respectively being otherwise than in closed mails, and the postage paid thereon, or postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto respectively, shall represent a less amount than the rate or rates of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant if prepaid, every such letter shall be charged with postage as an unpaid letter, provided that, in the case of any such letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to France or Algeria, or posted in France or Algeria addressed to the United Kingdom, the amount of such postage paid thereon, or stamp or stamps affixed thereto, shall be allowed and deducted in charging such postage thereon.

3. The postage of every letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Malta, Constantinople, or Egypt, or posted in Malta, Constantinople, or Egypt addressed to the United Kingdom and

Malta, Constantinople, or Egypt, in a closed mail, viâ Marseilles (the sea conveyance in the Mediterranean being by British or French packet-boat, or partly by French and partly by Italian packet-boat), or posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Gibraltar or Morocco, or posted in Gibraltar or Tangier addressed to the United Kingdom, for transmission respectively from the United Kingdom to Gibraltar or Morocco, or from Gibraltar or Tangier to the United Kingdom, in a closed mail, viâ France and Spain, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted either in money or by being stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage-duty payable thereupon under or by virtue of this Warrant; but if any such letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Malta, Constantinople, Alexandria, Cairo, Suez, Gibraltar, or Tangier, or posted in Malta, Constantinople, Alexandria, Cairo, Suez, Gibraltar, or Tangier addressed to the United Kingdom, shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon in the mode hereinbefore required, or with a postage paid thereon in the mode hereinbefore required which shall be less in amount than the rate or rates of postage to which such letter would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the deficient postage, together with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

4. The several rates of postage fixed by this present Warrant on the letters transmitted by the post as hereinbefore respectively mentioned, shall be in lieu of those now chargeable by law thereon.

5. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to repeal, alter, or affect any of the rates of postage now payable upon letters sent in transit through the United Kingdom between any British colony or foreign country and France, or any foreign country viâ France, nor shall anything herein contained be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said firstly hereinbefore recited Act, nor to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen, soldiers, and others employed in Her Majesty's service now by law enjoy, of sending and receiving letters by the post, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

6. The term "by the post" used in this Warrant shall, as to the sea conveyance, include the conveyance by any British packet-boat, and as to the conveyance between the United Kingdom and France, the said term shall also include the conveyance by private ships; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said firstly hereinbefore recited Act.

7. It shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter to alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

8. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of July one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

The Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Lieutenant-Colonel Stokes, R.E., the British Representative on the European Commission of the Danube, forwarding a Notice to vessels navigating the Black Sea, which the European Commission is about to publish, a copy of which is subjoined:—

**NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

A Timber Beacon, fifty feet high, has been erected by the European Commission of the Danube on the low sandy strip of coast between Lake Razem and the sea, to the South-west of the St George's Mouth of the Danube.

This beacon bears W. 3° 0' S. from the St George's Lighthouse, from which it is distant twenty-one miles.

To mark the St George's Shoal and Portitza anchorage, between this beacon and the lighthouse, eight buoys have been put down on the five fathom line of soundings, running nearly due east and west. The first and eighth buoys are painted red, the intermediate buoys black. They are 2½ miles apart.

The East Red Buoy bears from St George's Lighthouse S. 6° 0' W., distance 2½ miles.

The West Red Buoy bears from the beacon S 62° 5' E., distance 4½ miles.

The bearings are all magnetic, the miles all nautical.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Manila, reporting that, by a Decree dated 29th March 1870, the Customs' duties payable upon the importation into the Philippine Islands of the following articles, which were abolished by Decree of the 16th December 1867, have been re-imposed:—

Sweet oil, codfish (bacalao), salted or smoked beef, mutton, or pork, hams and venison, chick-peas, grain and seeds, such as hay, rye, beans, maize, lentils, &c., green herbs, garlic, onions, potatoes, and the like, butter and lard, dried, salted, and smoked fish, sardines, hung-beef, bacon, wheat, cattle, asses, horses, mules, sheep, &c., swine and buffaloes, trees, plants, and seeds, charcoal and live-fish.

The provisions of this Decree will come into operation at the expiration of eight months from the date of its publication.
