The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Law of the French Legislature, and

of an Imperial Decree concerning the publication thereof, relative to the legal tender of Notes of the Bank of France.

The following is a translation of the Articles of the Law :—

Art. 1. From the day of the promulgation of the present Law the notes of the Bank of France shall be received as legal money for the public coffers and by private persons.

Art. 2. Until fresh orders, the Bank is dispensed from the obligation of repaying its notes with specie.

Art. 3. In any case, the amount issued by the Bank and its branches shall not exceed 1,800 millions.

Art. 4. The dispositions of Arts. 2 and 3 above, are applicable to the Bank of Algeria, the issue of notes by which shall not exceed 18 millions.

Art. 5. The amount of notes shall be reduced to 25 francs.

By the Decree dated 12th August, the publication of the Law is to be made conformably to the Ordinances of the 27th November 1816, and 18th January 1817.

The Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have also received a Law of the French Legislature, relative to the time of expiration of Bills of Exchange.

The following is a translation of the Articles :—

Art. 1. The dates at which summonses, and all decisions providing for redress, ought to be made for every negociable bill drawn before the promulgation of the present Law, are deferred for one month.

Repayment shall not be demanded from the endorsers, and others involved, during the same period.

Interest shall be due from the time of expiration until payment.

Art. 2. No process can be instituted during the war against citizens called to military service, in virtue of Art. 2 of the Law of the 11th August 1870, or against the " Gardes Mobiles " serving with their corps.

By an Imperial Decree dated 13th August, its publication is to be made conformably to the Ordinances of the 27th November 1816, and the 18th January 1817.

EXPLANATIONS.

RECAPITULATION OF PAYMENTS RECEIVED FROM THE LONDON LOAN.

The amount of this loan, as it appears from the contract made with Messrs Bischoffheim and Goldschmidt, the 29th September 1868, annexed to Protocol No. CCXXV, is £135,000 sterling.

The first payment of this capital is borne on the receipts in the statement of accounts for the year 1868, joined to Protocol No. CCXXVIII; it amounted to £30,000, and has produced 746,250 francs. The remainder of the loan, amounting to £105,000, has been calculated at 25 francs per £1 sterling, and has thus realized 2,625,000 francs.

This sum has been apportioned as follows:—

The Loan expenses and commission have been entirely supported by the ordinary Revenue of the Commission, as shown in the foregoing statement, and in that for 1868.

NAVIGATION DUES LEVIED AT SULINA IN 1869.

These dues are levied by the European Commission by virtue of Article 16 of the Treaty of Paris of 30th March 1856, to cover the expenditure devoted to the improvement of the mouths of the Danube.

The collection is effected on the basis of the tariff joined to the Public Act signed at Galatz on the 2d November 1865, and in part modified by the provisions enacted on the 27th April 1867.

It also includes the dues imposed on the navigation for the pilotage and lighthouses at the mouth of the river.

In 1869 the gross produce of the dues levied at Sulina amounted to 1,698,227 francs 98 centimes, composed of the following items:—

II. LIABILITIES OF THE COMMISSION.

These are of three kinds :—

- 1st. Ten per cent. bonds.
- 2d. Loan concluded with Messrs Bischoffheim and Goldschmidt.
- 3d. Sum due to Turkey for advances made by her for works from 1856 to 1863.

FIRST.—10 per Cent. Bonds.

The sum total of 10 per cent. Bonds, of the issue of 1867 and 1868, in circulation, amounted at the end of 1868 to 65,550 ducats. 16,600 ducats having been paid off before maturity, at the end of 1869, there remained 48,950 ducats, which do not all mature until the 11th February 1872. The funds necessary for the redemption of these bonds have been deducted from the London Loan and placed provisionally in 8 per cent. bonds of the Roumanian Oppenheim Loan.

SECOND.—4 per cent. Loan of Messrs Bischoffheim and Goldschmidt.

The Loan concluded with this firm amounts to £135,000 sterling, and was destined to cover the expenses made and to be made on account of the permanent works. This Loan was issued at 96 per cent. A commission of 1 per cent. has been paid to the negotiator; the rate of interest is 4 per cent. per annum, payable half yearly. The liquidation of the capital will commence on the 30th June 1871, and will terminate on the 31st December 1882. The capital of this loan has been entirely received, as appears from the foregoing statements of accounts.

THIRD.—Debt to the Sublime Porta.

The total amount of this debt has been fixed at the sum of 314,247 ducats, or 3,739,540 francs.

On the other hand, the Ottoman Government is indebted to the European Commission, according to the account-current to the 31st December 1869, the sum of 37,845 francs 86 centimes.

The capital of 3,739,540 francs owed to Turkey will produce interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, from the 1st January 1871. It is repayable by annuities of 180,000 francs at the least, comprising interest and sinking fund, which must be met half-yearly, commencing from the 30th June 1883.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, stating that in consequence of the outbreak of cholera at Taganrog, all vessels from Russian ports of the Black Sea with foul bills of health are obliged to undergo Quarantine at the entrance of the Bosphorus, even though they may be bound to distant European ports. Also that a Board of Health at Constantinople having decided on suppressing all the Ottoman Quarantine Stations along the Danube, except Sulina, vessels, goods, and passengers proceeding to that river with a foul bill of health, will have to stop at Sulina, and there perform quarantine previous to their being allowed to enter the river. The mails, however, will be fumigated and forwarded at once by other conveyances.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 79.)—MEDITERRANEAN.—GULF OF NAPLES.

Mole Extension Light at Castellamare.

The Italian Government has given Notice that, from the 20th day of July 1870, a *fixed red* light will be suspended from a pole at the extremity of the mole in construction, and 92 yards from the harbour light.

ADRIATIC.—PROMONTORE.

Additional Light from Porer Lighthouse.

The Austrian Government has given Notice that, from the 20th day of July 1870, a *fixed red* light, 27 feet above the sea, will be exhibited from the lighthouse on Porer Rock, to denote the position of the *sunk rock* lying to the southward of it.

The light is visible through an arc of $11\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, and its extremes pass 220 yards on either side of the shoal; in clear weather it should be seen from a distance of five or six miles.

Re-establishment of St Cruz Light.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 80.)—FRANCE.—WEST COAST.

Alteration of Lights, Gironde River.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 31, dated 27th May 1869, respecting an alteration of lights in the Gironde River:

The French Government has given Notice that the new lighthouses being now completed, the following lights will be exhibited and changes effected from the 1st day of September 1870, viz:—

Palmyre Light.—From a lighthouse on the dunes of Point de la Palmyre, a *revolving* light, showing *red and green* alternately *twenty seconds*, elevated 167 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of fourteen miles.

The light is visible through an arc of 45 degrees from the westward.

The tower, 99 feet high, is of iron, built on three pillars; the upper part painted black, the lower part and pillars painted white. Position, lat. $45^{\circ} 40' 52''$ N., long. $1^{\circ} 8' 36''$ West from Greenwich.

Grand Banc Lights.—From a light-vessel moored inside the Grand Banc, two *fixed* white lights from separate masts, one elevated 34 feet above the sea, the other 23 feet; in clear weather they should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The light-vessel is moored in eight fathoms south-east of La Marvaise Shoal, in lat. $45^{\circ} 39' 52''$ long. $1^{\circ} 15' 51''$ West.

St George and Sulzac Lights.—Brilliance greatly increased; in clear weather they should be seen from a distance of 18 miles.

Faillaise and Pontailiac Lights,—will be discontinued.

Tres Negre Light,—will be changed from a fixed white light to a *fixed green* light, obscured in a seaward direction from a line drawn through the N.E. buoy of the Monrevel Bank, northward.

Richard Light.—The *fixed red* light will be increased in brilliance and exhibited from a tower 115 feet west of its present position: the light is elevated 105 feet above the sea, and in the direction of Tallais light it should in clear weather be seen from a distance of 16 miles.

Directions.—Vessels entering the Gironde by the Passe du Nord by night should approach by keeping the lights on Points de la Coubre and Palmyre in a line until the light-vessel on the Grand Banc is in one with the Cordouan light, keep those two in line until near the light-vessel, which pass to the northward, then steering eastward until the leading lights of St George and Sulzac are in one, which, as formerly, are to be kept so until the lights of Tallais and Richard are in one.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation $1\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ Easterly in 1870.]
