Board of Trade, Whitehall, October 13, 1870.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Circular Note issued by the Ottoman Government, announcing that the exportation of wheat and barley from the province of Bosnia has been temporarily prohibited.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, October 17, 1870.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, a copy of a Decree of the Prussian Government, annulling the prohibition of the export and transit of oats and bran across the frontier from Memel to Saarbruck. 'The Decree is dated 3d October, from which time it came into force.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, October 17, 1870.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid, copies of two Spanish Decrees of the 4th and 6th instant respectively, by which the ports of Alicante and Palma are declared foul in consequence of the appearance of yellow fever.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, October 18, 1870.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Ambassador in France, communicating an extract from a Decree dated 12th instant, relative to the prohibition of the export of provisions from that country, and of which the following is a translation.

The export, the re-exportation from bond, and the transit of cattle of all kinds, provisions, grain, flour, alimentary supplies of every sort, bran, and fodder, are prohibited over the whole extent of the frontiers of the Republic.
