WESTMINSTER, APRIL 2. 1801.

This day the Royal Assent, by Commission, was given to 'An Act for reviving and continuing, until the 1st day of October 1801, so much of an act made in the 39th and 40th years of the reign of his present Majesty, as relates to the reducing and better collecting the duties payable on the importation of starch; for reviving, continuing, until six weeks after the commencement of the next Session of Parliament, and amending an act made in the 39th year of the reign of his present Majesty, for enabling his Majesty to permit goods to be imported into Great Britain in neutral ships; for reviving and continuing, until the 5th day of March 1804, and from thence until the expiration of six weeks after the commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, an act made in the 37th year of the reign of his present Majesty, for authorising his Majesty to make regulations respecting the trade and commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope; and for reviving and making perpetual, an act made in the 33d year of the reign of his present Majesty, for preventing offences in obstructing seamen and others from pursuing their lawful occupations.—An Act to extend, until the 29th day of September 1801, the provisions of an act, made in the 13th year of the reign of his present Majesty, intitled; An act for the better cultivation, improvement, and regulation of the common arable fields, wastes, and commons of pasture in this kingdom, and for encouraging the cultivation of potatoes in open and common field lands—And to several road and private bills.

Copy of a letter transmitted by Admiral Milbanke  
Sheerneck's Hired Cutter, at sea,  
31st March 1801.

SIR,  
I have to inform you, that I captured, on the 29th instant, Cape La Hogue bearing S. six leagues, a French cutter privateer named La Pluton, Charles La Niece, Captain, mounting one four-pounder, besides muskets, manned with fourteen men; she had captured the evening before, to the

westward of Portland, the Friendship brig, from London bound to Dublin.

His Majesty's armed brig Lady Charlotte having parted company from me in chace the same night, I am led to hope he has retaken her.

Copy of a letter from Lieutenant Shephard, of the Pigmy cutter, to Capt. Ricketts, of the El Corfo.  
Pigmy Cutter, off the Ile Lafrina,  
18th Feb. 1801.

SIR,  
I beg leave to inform you, that this day, at two P. M. after a short chace, I captured off this island, the French Trabacolo privateer l'Adelaide, mounting two twelve pounders, and one six pounder, small arms, &c. commanded by Dominique Cannilla, with fifty-one men; seven days from Ancona, had taken one small prize, and was herself formerly an Ancona fishing vessel.
