The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has, under the provisions of the 'Burial Ground (Scotland) Act, 1855,' made a Representation stating that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor of the Sheriff-Substitute of the County of Caithness, finding that the Principal Burial Ground of the PARISH of WICK is dangerous to health, and offensive and contrary to decency.

And Whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that Burials be forthwith discontinued in the said Burial Ground of the Parish of Wick, situated within or near the Royal Burgh of Wick, with the exception of the widows and widowers of persons who have already been interred therein.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give Notice of such Representation, and to Order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the 27th day of March next.

And Her Majesty is Further pleased to direct that this Order or Notice thereof be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies or notices

thereof be fixed, as required by the above mentioned Act, on the doors of the Church of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish of Wick, one month before such Representation is so considered.
