Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, Commander in Chief of his Majefty's flaps and vessels employed on a particular service to Evan Nepean, Esq. Secretary of the Admiralty, dated on board his Majefty's ship London, in Copen-hagen Road, the 9th April, 18-1.

The Hon. Lieutenant-Colonel Stewart having volunteered his fervices by being the bearer of these dispatches, I have accepted thereof, on a belief that it will be more expeditious than by fea.

I have the pleasure to transmit an armiftice concluded between the Court of Den-

mark and myfelf.

I mean, as foon as the difabled ships are refitted, and the world of the wounded moved into the Holstein Danish ship of the line, which I have commissioned as an hospital ship, to proceed over the Grounds into the Baltic to put into execution the re maining part of my inflructions.

The Isis and Monarch being found in so bad a flate from the late action, as to render it necessary to fend them to England to have their damages repaired, I shall fend them home for that purpose with the Hol-stein hospital-ship, which has the wounded

Art. II. The armed ships and vessels belonging to his Danish Majessy, shall remain in their present actual situation as to armament, equipment, and hostile position, and the treaty commonly understood as the Treaty of Armed Neutrality shall, as lar as a lates to the co-operation of Denmark, be suffered by while the armistice remains in force.

Art. IV. The sleet of Admiral Sir Hyde Parker shall be permitted to provide itself at Copenhage, and along the coasts of the different islands and provinces of Denmark and Jutland included, with every thing which it may require for the health and comfort of his crews.

Art. V. Aumiral Sir Hyde Parker shall send on shore all such subjects of his Danish Majesty as are shore all such subjects of his Danish Majesty as are now on board the British sleet under his command, the Danish Government engaging to give an acknowledgement for them, as also for all such wounded as were permitted to be landed after the action of the 2d inst. in order that they may be accounted for in favour of Great Britain, in the unfortunate event of the renewal of hostilities.

Art. VII. The armiftice is to continue uninterrupted by the contracting parties for the space of fourteen weeks from the signature hereof, at the expiration of which time, it shall be in the power of either of the said parties, to declare a cessation of the same, and to recommence hossilities, upon viving hautteen deep nearly notice.

The condition of this armidice are upon all occasions to be explained in the most liberal and loyal manner, so as to remove all ground for future diputes, and facilitate the means of bringing about the refloration of hermony and good understanding

between the two kingdoms.
