PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has, under the provisions of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, made a Representation stating that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor of the Sheriff of the County of Argyll, finding that the allegations contained in a Memorial presented by certain Ratepayers in the Parish of Glassary, in the said County,—that the Burial Ground adjoining the *Quoad Sacra* Church of Lochgilphead is overcrowded, dangerous to health, offensive, and contrary to decency,—are proved.

And Whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that burials should be forthwith discontinued in the Burial Ground adjoining the *Quoad Sacra* Church of Lochgilphead, within the Burgh of Lochgilphead, and Parish of Glassary, with the exception of widowers and widows whose wives and husbands have been interred therein at the date of the said Order, provided that a period of not less than ten years has elapsed between interments in the same grave.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the 5th day of October next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order, or Notice thereof, be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies or notices be fixed, as required by the above-mentioned Act, on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered.
