At the Court at the Queen's House, the 16th of June, 1801, present, the King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.—Whereas his Swedish Majesty has issued a proclamation, directing the embargo lately laid on British vessels in the ports of Sweden to be taken off, and renewing the commercial relations between the two kingdoms; his Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to order, that the Order made by his Majesty in Council, on the 14th of January last, directing that no ships or vessels belonging to any of his Majesty's subjects should be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the ports of Russia, Denmark, or Sweden (and which said order has been already, by another order made by his Majesty in Council on the 4th day of this inst. June, revoked and discharged, so far as relates to ships and vessels belonging to any of his Majesty's subjects entering and clearing out for any of the ports of Russia or Denmark), be in like manner revoked and discharged, as to ships and vessels belonging to any of his Majesty's subjects entering and clearing out for any of the ports of Sweden.

And his Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the general embargo or stop directed by his Majesty's orders in Council of the same date to be made of all Russian, Danish, or Swedish vessels then within any of the ports, harbours, or roads of the united kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or which should thereafter arrive in any of the said ports, harbours, or roads, or in the ports, harbours, or roads of any of the forts and settlements belonging to the Crown of the united kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of any his Majesty's colonies, islands, and plantations, together with all persons and effects on board such ships and vessels; and also all other orders made by his Majesty in Council touching the said embargo or stop upon the ships and vessels, fore-said (and which said orders have been already, by another order made by his Majesty in Council on the said 4th day of June, revoked and discharged, so far as relates to the ships and vessels, persons and effects, belonging to the subjects of Russia or Denmark), be in like manner revoked and discharged, as to ships and vessels, persons and effects belonging to the subjects of Sweden.

And his Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Order made by his Majesty in Council,

on the 28th of the said month of January, forbidding the payment of any money or bills due or payable to or on behalf of any person or persons, being subjects of or residing within the dominions of the Emperor of Russia, or the Kings of Denmark or Sweden, or any of them, for the freight of merchandise imported in any Russian, Swedish or Danish ship detained under the embargo, (and which Order has been already, by another Order made by his Majesty in Council of the said 4th day of June, revoked and discharged, so far as relates to the payment of any money or bills due or payable for freight to the subjects of Russia or Denmark), be in like manner revoked and discharged, as to the payment of any money or bills due or payable for freight to the subjects of Sweden.

And the Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WESTMINSTER, JUNE 20.

This day the Lords being met, and the Commons attending, the Royal Assent, by commission, was given to—

An act for granting to his Majesty till the 25th March 1802, additional stamp duties in Ireland on bonds, bills of exchange, promissory notes, insurances, &c. An act for granting a certain sum for the charge of the Dublin Workhouse and Foundling Hospital, and for amending former acts relative to this institution.

An act for settling and securing a certain annuity on Lady Abercromby, Baroness Abercromby of Aboukir, and the two next persons to whom the title of Baron Abercromby shall descend, in consideration of the eminent merits of the late Right Hon. General Sir Ralph Abercromby.

An act for reviving and continuing till the 20th May 1802, the act of the 39th and 40th of the King, for repealing the duties on sugar and coffee exported, and for allowing British Plantation sugar to be warehoused, and for reviving the act of the 32d of the King, relative to ascertaining the average price of sugar, regulating the drawback on exportation, &c. An act to permit Portugal wine to be landed and warehoused, without payment of

the duties, under certain restrictions, for a limited time. An act to indemnify persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for employments in Ireland.

An act to continue the acts of the Irish Parliament relative to the duties on tobacco, malt, auctions, glass bottles, paper hangings, tanned hides, vellum and parchment; regulation of the trade of rectifying spirits; improvement of the fisheries; granting of excise permits and certificates; bounties on the exportation of certain manufactures; licenses to persons in certain trades; collection of the revenue; granting annuities, &c. An act to amend the Irish acts relative to the retailing of wine, and malt and spiritous liquors, preventing their immoderate use, granting licenses, &c. An act to amend and continue the Irish act for regulating the trade of a distiller, and securing the duties on home-made spirits.

An act to continue and amend the act for the encouragement of the trade and manufactures of the Isle of Man, and for improving its revenue. An act to render valid all acts done in execution of Orders of Council relating to bills of exchange drawn in Russia, and to freight of Russian, Swedish, and Danish ships. An act to ascertain what offices or places of profit under the Crown in Ireland shall disqualify persons from sitting in the House of Commons of the United Parliament.

An act for the better prevention of the forgery of the notes and bills of exchange of persons carrying on the business of bankers.

An act to explain and amend the act relative to the balance due to his Majesty by the late Right Hon. Richard Rigby. An act to continue and amend the act for granting certain allowances to Adjutants, Serjeant-Majors, and Serjeants of Militia disembodied. An act for making allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern militia officers in time of peace. Two acts to enable the Corporations of the Royal Exchange and London Assurance, to assure vessels, with their cargoes, employed in navigation. An act to explain and amend the act relative to the use of horse lutes in the making of boots and shoes, and for preventing the making of raw hides in the slaying. An act to extend the powers and increase the duties of the corporation of the Trinity House, Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

An act to amend two acts of the 13th and 29th of the King, for making more commodious the nar-

hours of the town of Greenock, and for other purposes mentioned in the said act; for watering the said town, regulating the fares of coachmen, chairmen, porters, and carters, plying in the said town, and of pilots, watermen, and jobbers, employed in the said harbours, and on the River Clyde; and for feuing out the glebe of the said town. An act for explaining, altering, and amending the act of the 12th of the King, for deepening, cleansing, scouring, and maintaining the harbour of Port-Glasgow, and for other purposes mentioned in the said act.

An act for repairing and widening the roads from Dumfries to Moffat, and from Gratney; by Annan, Dumfries, and Saughbar, to the confines of the County of Ayr, and several other roads in the counties of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright.

Fifty-six acts relative to roads, canals, piers, harbours, inclosures, estates, &c. in England, and forty-six private acts—in all one hundred and twenty-nine acts.

WESTMINSTER, JUNE 23.

This day the Lords being met, and the Commons assembled, the Royal Assent, by Commission, was given to

An act for continuing till March 25, 1802, an act of the present session, intituled an act for continuing and amending two acts of the Irish Parliament, for the suppression of the rebellion in Ireland, and for the protection of persons and property, &c. in that kingdom. An act to exempt Irish Members of Parliament, and other persons who may have only an occasional residence in Great Britain, from the payment of certain duties.

An act to remove doubts respecting the eligibility of persons in holy orders to sit in the House of Commons. An act for the further relief of debtors with respect to the imprisonment of their persons. Several acts relative to roads, canals, inclosures, &c. in England, and ten private acts.
