DOWNING-STREET. JUNE 29. 1801.

A dispatch, of which the following is a copy, has been this day received from the Earl of Elgin, by the Right Hon. Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Copy of a letter from Lord Elgin to Lord Hawkesbury, dated Constantinople, May-23. 1801.

MY LORD,

An officer is arrived from the Captain Pasha, with the intelligence that General Hutchinson has marched from Rosetta on the 8th instant, with four thousand British troops, in company with a corps of Turks of equal force, under the command of the Captain Pasha, and on the 9th attacked the French near Rahmanich. The enemy were driven in; and in the course of the night they retired towards Cairo, having left a small garrison in the entrenchments of Rahmanich. On the 10th, the fort surrendered, and the combined force then proceeded towards Cairo, having concerted their movements with the Grand Vizir, who was at El Hanka, a position four leagues distant from Cairo, in a north-east direction. Our loss at Rahmanich is stated not to exceed thirty men.

The Turkish officer reports, that a reinforcement of 3000 British troops had arrived at Aboukir about the 6th of May.
