Copy of a letter from Mr JOHN PETTIGREW, commander of the ship Intrepid, letter of marque, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated Barbadoes, 9th July, 1801.

S I R,

I HAVE the honour to acquaint you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 22d day of June, in N. latitude 10 deg. 25 min. west longitude, per accompts, 40 deg. 10 min. on board the Intrepid of Liverpool, bearing letters of marque, under my command, having in company the ships Dominica Packet and Alfred, I had the good fortune to capture, after a running engagement of nearly two hours, the Spanish frigate-built ship La Galga, commanded by Francisco de Pascadello, and mounting twenty-four heavy sixes, and seventy-eight men, bound to Cadiz or any port in Spain, loaded with hides, cocoa, indigo, and copper in bars, the quantity not yet known. I am happy to say we sustained no other loss than that of one of my brave men, and our sails and rigging a good deal cut. The other ships have not sustained any damage, except the prize, which has suffered considerably both in hull, and masts, and rigging. I arrived here on the 4th of July, with the prize and above-mentioned ships.

COUNTY OF BANFF,
TURNPIKE ACT.

IN conformity to standing orders of the House of Commons, Notice is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, during the ensuing session thereof, for a Turnpike Bill, to enable certain persons to be therein named Trustees, to make, widen, and repair; the following roads in the county of Banff, and within those parts of the county of Elgin and Forres adjoining thereto, and lying to the south and east of the River Spey; and also in the adjoining parts of the county of Aberdeen; and to erect Toll-bars and levy Toll-duties thereon, viz.

The road from the Bridge of Banff to the River Spey, at or near Boat of Bog, passing through the parishes of Banff, Boyndie, Fordyce, Deskford, Cullen, Rathven, and Bellie.—The road from Banff to Huntly, passing through the parishes of Banff, Boyndie, Alva, Fordyce, Ordequhill, Forglan, Marnoch, Inverkeithney, Rothemay, Grange, Forgue, Drumblade, Gartly, Cairney and Huntly.—The road from Portsoy to Huntly passing through the parishes last above-mentioned.—The road from Banff to Keith, passing through the parishes of Banff, Alva, Boyndie, Fordyce, Ordequhill, Deskford, Grange, Rothiemay, and Keith.—The road from Portsoy to Keith, passing through the parishes of Cullen, Deskford, Fordyce, Grange, Rothemay, and Keith. The road from Huntly to Fochobers, and Boat of Bog passing through the parishes of Huntly, Cairney, Glass, Keith, Boharm, and Bellie.—The road from Keith towards Grantoun, passing through the parishes of Keith, Boharm, Botriphney, Glass, Mortlach, Aberlour, Inveraven, Kirkmichael.—The road from Mortlach to Fochobers and Garmouth, passing through the parishes of Mortlach, Botriphney, Aberlour, Boharm, Keith and Bellie.—The road from Mortlach to Huntly, passing through the parishes of Mortlach, Glass, Botriphney, Cairney, Gartly, and Huntly. Application will at the same time be made for a bill, for levying a certain conversion in money in lieu of the Statute Labour, and otherwise regulating the making and repairing the High Roads and Bridges in the said county of Banff.
