King of the Two Sicilies.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, SEPT. 12. 1301. Entract of a letter from Rear-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, to Evan Nepean, Eiq. dated in Rofia. Bay, the 26th July 1801.

I herewith inclose Captain Hood's report of the 13th inft.; and also the return of he killed and wounded.

His Majesty's ship Venerable, at fea, 13th July 1801.

You must have observed my giving chace to an enemy's line of battle ship at day break this morning, at feven, she hoisted French colours, and I could perceive her to be an eighty gun ship; at half-past, being within point-blank thor, the enemy coramenced firing his flern chace guns, which I did not return for fear of retarding our progress, until the light and haffling airs threw the two ships broad-side to, within musket Undress-White or grey lutestrings, shot, when a steady and warm conside was lkept up for an hour and a half, and we had

trimmed, fringed, or plain linen, black cipally directing his fire to our masts and rigging; I had at this time the misfortune to perceive the main mast to fall overboard, The Court to change the mourning on the fore and mizen-mail nearly in the fame.

It was with much difficulty I was enabled to get the Venerable off her cables and an hors, all disabled, and it was only by the great exertion of the Thames with the boats you fent me, she. was faved, after being on shore for some time.

I shall have no occasion to comment on the bravery of the officers and ship's company in this action, who had with much patience and perfeverance fuffered great fatigue by their exertions to get the ship to lea, and not five hundred men able to go to quarters; but I beg leave to add, I have been most ably supported by Licut. Lillicrap, fecond of the enerable, (first absent) all the other officers and men who have my warmest recommendation, and have to lament the lofs of Mr Williams, Matter, an excellent'officer, with many other valuable people killed and wounded; a list of which I have the honour to enclose.
