A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring the Ceffation of Arms, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between his Majesty and the French Republic, and enjoining the observance thereof.

GEORGE R.

Whereas Preliminaries for refloring Peace between Us and the French Republic were figned at London on the first day of this instant October, by the Plenipotentiary of Us, and by the Plenipotentiary of the French Republic: And whereas, for the putting an end to the calamities of war, as foon and as far as may be possible, it hath been agreed between Us, and the French Republic, as follows; that is to fay, that as foon as the Preliminaries shall be signed and ratissed, friendship should be established between Us and the French Republic, by fea and land, in all parts of the world, and that all hostilities should cease immediately; and in order to prevent all causes of complaint and dispute which might arife on account of prizes which might be made at sea, after the fignature of the preliminary articles, it has been also reciprocally agreed, That the vessels and effects which might be taken in the British Channel and in the North Seas, after the space of Twelve Days, to be computed from the exchange of the Ratification of the Preliminary Articles, should be restored on each side; That the term should be One Month from the British Channel and the North Seas as far as the Canary Islands inclusively, whether in the Ocean or in the Mediterranean; Two Months from the faid Canary Islands, as far as the Equa-

Articles between Us and the French Republic were exchanged by the respective Plenipotentiaries of Us, and of the French Republic, on the tenth day of this instant October, from which day the several terms abovementioned of twelve days, of one month, of two months, and sive months, are to be computed: And whereas it is Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the Cessation of Hostilities between Us and the French Republic should be agreeable to the several epochs fixed between Us and the French Republic, We have thought sit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to notify the same to all our loving subjects; and We do declare, That Our Royal Will and Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all our officers both at sea and land, and all other our subjects whatsoever, to forbear all Acts of Hostility, either by sea or land, against the French Republic, and their Allies, their vassals or subjects, from and after the respective times abovementioned, and under the penalty of incurring our highest displeasure.

Given at our Court at Windsor, the twelfth day of this instant October, in the forty first year of our reign, and in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and one.

Whereas his Majesty was pleased, by his order in Council of the twenty-first of May last, to direct that the several bounties therein mentioned, should continue to be paid to every able and ordinary feamen, and able-bodied landman, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in his Majesty's navy, on or before the thirty-first day of this instant October; and also that the reward therein mentioned for discovering able and ordinary feaman, who should secrete themfelves, should likewise continue to be paid to any person who should discover such seamen, so that fuch seamen should be taken for his Majesty's fervice: His Majesty having this day taken the faid order into confideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to declare, That the faid bounties and reward shall from henceforth cease, determine, and be no longer paid or payable, any thing therein contained to the contrary notwithstanding: Whereof all perfons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
