DESPATCII has been received from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Madrid, enclosing a copy of a Note from the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs, in which it is stated, as regards passports, that all that is required from foreigners entering Spain is that they should be provided with some document to prove their identity. British subjects who may be about to proceed to Spain are nevertheless recommended to provide themselves with passports, and attention is again called to the note appended to the Passport

Regulations issued by direction of the Secretary of State, in which the advantage of a passport as a ready means of identification is pointed out for the information of British subjects travelling on the Continent generally.
