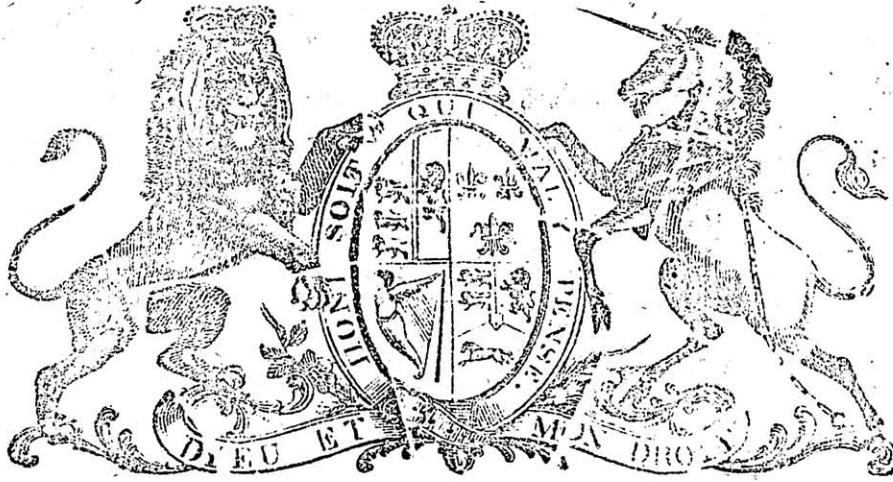

FROM THE LONDON GAZETTE.

At the Court of St James's, the 18th of November 1801.

PRESENT,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This day the Right Honourable Charles Bragge, Treasurer of his Majesty's navy, was, by his Majesty's command, sworn of his Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council, was also pleased to order, that in the absence of the Right Honourable Charles, Earl of Liverpool, the Right Honourable Sylvester Lord Glenbervie should be President of the Committee appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations.

Copy of a Letter from the Right Hon. Lord Keith, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated on board the Foudroyant, off Alexandria, the 28th of August 1801.

S I R,

I have the honour of continuing a report of such captures made by his Majesty's ships under my command, as have reached me, since my last return on the 17th February; and am Sir, &c.
