The Earl of Derby, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Consul at Galatz, the following translation of a Notice issued by the Captain of the Port, notifying the reopening of the Navigation of the Danube:—

(Translation.)

The Captain of the Port, Galatz, Roumania.

Notice.

In conformity with an Order of the Minister for Foreign Affairs, No. 2476, received this day, the Captain of the Port informs persons interested in shipping that, in consequence of the cessation of hostilities and of the conclusion of peace, the navigation of the Danube is free, as under ordinary circumstances, at the same time he brings to the notice of shipowners, that as torpedoes have not been removed from certain localities, navigation will be at their own risk and peril.

The Minister has taken measures for the early removal of these torpedoes.
