The King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Viscount of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto the Right Hon. Asheton Baron Curzon, and to the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, stile, and title of Viscount Curzon, of Penn, in the county of Buckingham.

At the Court at St JAMES'S, the 24th of February 1802,

PRESENT,

The KING'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint Henry Bentinck, Esquire, Captain-General and Governor in Chief of the island of St Vincent, Bequia, and such other of the islands commonly called the Grenadines, as lie to the northward of the island of Carriacou, in America, he, this day, took the usual oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of his Majesty's Plantations.

REDEMPTION OF LAND TAX.

MR ANTHONY WOODHEAD,
Lately Writer and Solicitor at Law, residing in Edinburgh, now deceased.

MR WOODHEAD, who was lawful son of Mr John Woodhead, originally of Yorkshire, afterwards Supervisor of Excise in Edinburgh, by Margaret Woodhead, (formerly Alder) originally of Westfield, in the county of Northumberland, by his last will, and deed of settlement, conveyed and made over to JAMES THOMSON, weaver in Edinburgh, whom failing, to THOMAS THOMSON, his eldest son; whom also failing, to EDWARD THOMSON, ironmonger in Edinburgh; his whole estates and effects, real and personal, in trust, for the ends and purposes therein expressed; one moiety of the free proceeds of which estates, he ordered to be paid at the first term of Whitunday or Martinmas, which shall happen at the distance of twelve months after his decease, to ANTHONY and ALEXANDER WOODHEAD, lawful sons of HUGH WOODHEAD, his brother, sometime Officer of Excise at Linlithgow, and afterwards at some place in the county of Fife, North Britain; and to any other child or children of the said Hugh Woodhead, if any such shall then exist, equally among them, share and share alike, if more than one; or to the child or children, or other descendants of them, or any of them deceased; or to any surviving descendant of his said brother, if one only shall exist, and their respective heir, executors, or assignees,—and if only one, the whole of the said moiety to that one, and to their, his, or her heirs, executors, or assignees; whom failing, to the testator's own nearest lawful heirs, executors, or assignees whomsoever; of which will, the testator nominated and appointed the said James, Thomas, and Edward Thomson, in the order abovementioned to be sole executors.
