January 22, 1880.

THE following Notice is substituted for that which was published in the Edinburgh Gazette of the 23d January 1880:—

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that a Competitive Examination for Boy Clerkships of the Lower Division of the Civil Service, will be held in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, on Thursday and Friday the 12th and 13th February 1880, under the Regulations dated 22d May 1876, and amended by subsequent notice in the London Gazette. The number of persons to be selected at this examination is 41.

When a vacancy occurs in any one of the towns above mentioned it will be offered to the Candidate highest on the list at the time, but he will not be required to accept it, and quit his place of residence, if he prefers to wait for the chance of obtaining an appointment at that place during his period of eligibility. All the 41 vacancies to which this notice refers will, it is expected, be in London.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 2d of February, an 'application' on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from him at once.
