**WESTMINSTER, JUNE 3.**

This day the Royal Assent, by commission, was given to

An act for raising a certain sum of money by way of annuities on debentures for the service of Ireland.

An act to repeal an act passed in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of his present Majesty for granting stamp duties on certain medicines, and for charging other duties in lieu thereof, and for making effectual provision for the better collection of the said duties.

An act for allowing until the twentieth day of May one thousand eight hundred and three, additional bounties on refined sugar exported, and discontinuing the duty thereon, granted by an act of this Session of Parliament.

An act to amend so much of an act made in the Parliament of Ireland, in the thirty-seventh year of the reign of his present Majesty, intituled an act for vesting a certain fund in Commissioners at the end of every quarter of a year to be by them applied to the reduction of the national debt, and to direct the application of additional funds in case of future loans to the like purpose, as relates to the Commissioners for carrying the same into execution.

An act to continue until the 30th day of May 1803, and amend an act made in the last Session of Parliament, for regulating and allowing drawbacks on sugar exported from Ireland, and for allowing British Plantation sugar to be warehoused in Ireland, and for granting an additional drawback on the exportation of refined sugar.

An act for extending the provisions of an act made the 34th year of the reign of his present Majesty, intituled, An act for directing the appointment of Commissioners to administer certain oaths and declarations required by law to be taken and made by persons offering to vote at the election of members to serve in Parliament, to all oaths now required by law to be taken by voters at elections for members to serve in Parliament.

An act for the further encouragement of Irish mariners, and for other purposes relating thereto, and to 15 English road and private acts.
