Hill, (commonly called Lord Arthur Moyles William Hill) second son of the said Arthur late Marquis of Downshire by the said Mary his wife, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, and in default of such issue to the Right Hon. Arthur Marcus Cecil Hill (commonly called Lord Arthur Marcus Cecil Hill), third son of the said Arthur, late Marquis of Downshire, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten; and in default of such issue to the Right Hon. Arthur Augustus Edwin Hill (commonly called Lord Arthur Augustus Edwin Hill), fourth son of the said Arthur, late Marquis of Downshire, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten; and in default of such issue to the Right Hon. George Augusta Hill (commonly called Lord George Augusta Hill), fifth son of the said Arthur, late Marquis of Downshire, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten; and in default of such issue to the Most Hon. Arthur Blundell Sandys Trumbull Marquis of Downshire, eldest son of the said Arthur, late Marquis of Downshire, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten.
