Scheme, under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, for the Administration of the Endowments in the Parish of Moffat and County of Dumfries, known as Morrison's Bequest, hitherto held and administered under last Will and Testament of William Morrison, dated 26th July 1837, and recorded in the Books of Council and Session 7th April 1838; and Disposition by Andrew Jamieson, dated 10th June 1863, and recorded in the Books of Council and Session 1st July 1863; the Johnstone Bequests, hitherto held and administered under Bond of Annuity in favour of Messrs. Walter Johnstone and Peter Johnstone and others, by John James Hope Johnstone, Esquire, dated 23d and 29th May 1849; Feu Charter by John James Hope Johnstone, in favour of Peter Johnstone and others, dated 13th March 1857; Rules and Regulations for Female Industrial School, Moffat, by Peter Johnstone, dated 19th January 1863; Bond of Annuity by John James Hope Johnstone in favour of Peter Johnstone and others, dated 23d and 28th May 1849; Feu Charter by John James Hope Johnstone in favour of Peter Johnstone and others, dated 4th May 1864; Rules and Regulations of Evan Water School by Peter Johnstone, dated 3d January 1863; and Disposition and Deed of Mortification by Peter Johnstone to the Heritors of Moffat, dated 5th December 1856, and recorded in the Books of Council and Session 28th November 1865: Dr. Robert Johnstone's Endowment, hitherto held and administered under Will by Dr. Robert Johnstone, dated 30th September 1639: and Aitken's Endowment, hitherto held and administered under Disposition and Deed of Settlement by John Aitken.

Preamble.

1 and 2. Future Administration, Transference of Property.

3. Constitution and Election of Governing Body.

The governing body, hereinafter called the governors, shall be constituted as follows:—

Three shall be elected by the School Board of Moffat,

One shall be elected by the Heritors of Moffat of above one hundred pounds annual rent.

One shall be appointed by the Proprietor of the estate of Annandale or by his Tutors or Curators if he be a minor or incapable of acting,

One shall be appointed to hold office for life by the Managers of Morrison's School, and

One shall be appointed to hold office for life by the Trustees appointed under said deeds by Walter and Peter Johnstone.

On the death of each of the aforesaid governors for life, a governor shall be elected in his place by the then existing governors, who shall hold office for a period of five years, and thereafter until the The governors elected by the School Board shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of five years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governor elected by the heritors, and the governor appointed by the proprietor of the estate of Annandale, shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of three years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governors shall, in the case of all elections or appointments subsequent to the first, hold office for a period of five years from and after the expiry of the term of office of their predecessors, except as hereinafter provided. Each election shall be made at a meeting convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the electing body. The governors may be elected by the several electing bodies either out of their own number or otherwise. Any governor may be re-elected or re-appointed. The first governors shall be elected or appointed as soon as conveniently may be after the date of this Scheme. The clerk or other officer of the governors shall, at least one month before the expiry of the term of office of any governor, give notice to the proper electing body, or to the person entitled to appoint, as the case may be, and the electing body, or the person entitled to appoint, shall, as soon as conveniently may be after such notice, appoint or elect a governor to hold office from the expiry of said term. Any election or appointment not made as aforesaid within three months from the date of this Scheme, or from the date of the notice of expiry of a term of office or from the date of the notice of a vacancy, as hereinafter prescribed, shall in that case be made by the then existing governors.

Application of Income.

23. Application of Income. — The governors, after paying the necessary expenses of management, and the burdens and taxes affecting the Endowment, shall apply the free income of the Endowment in the manner hereinafter provided.

24. Discontinuance of Schools.—The governors shall, within twelve months after the date of this Scheme, discontinue the school presently maintained in Moffat under Morrison's Bequest, the school presently maintained by the Johnstone trustees at Evan Water and the school known as the Female Industrial School, Moffat, and shall transfer and convey the school buildings, with their sites, pertinents, and furnishings, to the School Board of Moffat; but, notwithstanding the provisions hereof, they may, on obtaining the authority of the Scotch Education Department, continue any of the said schools until such time as may be fixed. During the continuance of the said schools they shall be inspected in such manner as the Scotch Education Department may from time to time prescribe. 'The governors shall have power to pay to the teachers of the said schools, so long as the schools shall, be continued, the salaries presently paid to them out of the funds of the respective Endowments.

first day of August after the expiry of that period. | apply a sum not exceeding £40 yearly in paying, in whole or in part as they may think fit, the fees of scholars, with books and stationery, at public or Stateaided schools in the parish of Moffat, for elementary education as defined in the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882. The free scholars shall be called the Morrison Free Scholars, and shall be children whose parents or guardians, not being in receipt of parochial relief, are in such circumstances as to require aid for providing elementary education, and are persons who, in the opinion of the governors, ought not to be required to apply to the Parochial Board for such aid.

In the case of children under ten years of age, the selection of free scholars shall be made with due regard to merit as ascertained by such examination, suited to the age of the candidates, as the governors may from time to time prescribe; or in the case of children for whom such examination is unsuitable, by evidence that the children possess such qualifications as to justify their selection; and in the case of children who have been in attendance at school during one or more school years, the governors shall, in making their selection, give special weight to good conduct, attendance, and progress at school during the previous year. The fees, in respect of children under ten years of age shall not be paid for more than one school year without reappointment, and the amount to be expended in paying fees for such children shall not exceed one-third of the amount to be applied under this section.

In the case of children of ten years of age and upwards, the free scholars shall be selected by competitive examinations, which shall be open to all of the same age who are eligible in terms hereof, whether they have or have not previously been beneficiaries; and for such children the school fees may continue to be paid for such period not exceeding three years as the governors may determine. If any scholar gain a school bursary his school fees shall no longer be paid under this

section.

The governors, at the end of every school year, shall obtain from the teacher or teachers a special report as to the conduct, regularity of attendance, and progress of all scholars whose school fees are paid in whole or in part under this section, and the fees of no scholar shall continue to be paid in regard to whom such report is not satisfactory.

The governors may, if they see fit, intrust the carrying out of the provisions of this clause to a committee appointed by them, partly from their own number, and partly from the members of the

School Board of Moffat.

26. School Bursaries.—The governors shall apply an annual sum of not less than £40 nor more than £60 in establishing school bursaries, to be called the Johnstone School Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £5 nor more than £10. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parish of Moffat, who have passed the fifth standard of the present Scotch Code, or such standard as may from time to time be fixed by the Scotch Education Department, pursuant to the Education (Scotland) Acts, as that entitling children to total exemption from the obligation to attend school, and whose parents or guardians are in such circumstances as to require aid for giving them higher education; these bursaries shall be tenable at public or State-aided schools 25. Free Scholarships.—The governors shall in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches, for such period, not exceeding three | the date of the competition shall not exceed fouryears, as the governors may determine.

27. Annual Payment to the School Board of Moffat.—The governors shall pay the surplus income of the Endowment to the School Board of Moffat, on condition-

- That on the discontinuance by the governors of the said school at Evan Water, the School Board shall establish and maintain a school in or near the said school buildings for the accommodation of the children in the valley of Evan Water, whether belonging to the parish of Moffat or to the parish of Kirkpatrick-
- (2) That the School Board shall apply the said annual payment for the purposes of higher instruction, by providing a sufficient salary to the head teacher of Moffat Academy, who shall in the case of any appointment after the date of this Scheme, be a graduate of some university in the United Kingdom, and by supplying such assistance as may enable him to devote his attention chiefly to the upper standards, and to the teaching of specific subjects.
- (3) That the sum applied out of the school fund for payment of salaries in the said Moffat Academy shall not be on a lesser scale than as at the date of this Scheme.
- (4) That the School Board give free education in the Academy to not more than fifteen scholars who have passed the fifth standard, and who shall be selected by the governors by competitive examination under the conditions and regulations of the twenty-sixth section hereof, from scholars attending public or State-aided schools in the parishes of Moffat, Wamphray, and Kirkpatrick-Juxta. The free education thus given shall be continued for a period not exceeding be three years, and shall include all specific subjects taught in the school.

The governors shall satisfy themselves from time to time that the said annual payment is applied under the conditions contained herein for the promotion of higher instruction; and, if it appears to them that the said annual payment is not so applied, they shall withdraw the same, provided always that, if the said School Board object thereto, the consent of the Scotch Education Department shall be obtained before the withdrawal of the said

annual payment.

28. Application of Annual Payment to School Board in event of Withdrawal.—In the event of the School Board declining to accept the said annual payment under the conditions of the immediately preceding section, or in the event of its being at any time withdrawn under the provisions thereof, the governors shall maintain the school at Evan Water under the conditions of the previous section, and shall apply the surplus income in establishing bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £10 nor of more than £15. These bursaries shall be tenable for a period not exceeding three years at such schools for higher education or technical instruction as the governors may approve, and shall be awarded by competitive examination among the pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parishes of Moffat, Wamphray, and Kirkpatrick-Juxta, whose age at

29. Forfeiture of Bursaries .- If, in the judgment of the governors, the holder of any bursary shall be guilty of serious misconduct, or fail to make reasonable progress, they may withdraw such bursary, and their determination in such case shall be final.

30. Annual Distribution of Bursaries. — T & governors shall establish the bursaries herein provided for in such manner as to secure that they shall be awarded in as nearly as possible equal

numbers in each year.

31. Residue of Income.—The residue of the free annual income, in so far as it has not been applied under the provisions of this Scheme, shall be invested by the governors as soon as it shall amount to £50, and form part of the capital fund of the Endowment.

2. Transference of Property.—From and after

the date of this Scheme, the whole rights, funds, and estate, heritable and moveable, belonging to the McNeelie Mortification, or vested in the present governing body thereof, shall be transferred to, and vested in, the governing body hereinafter constituted, without the necessity of any new conveyance or instrument; and the present Trustees under the foresaid Deed by Mrs. Isabella Butter or Caddall shall pay to the governing body hereinafter constituted, the capital sum of £1400 as the proportion of the said Endowment applicable to educational purposes; and shall further transfer and convey to the School Board of Ballantrae the school buildings held by them at Glenapp, with their sites, pertinents, and furnishings.

3. Constitution and Election of Governing Body.—The governing body, hereinafter called the governors, shall consist of five persons, of

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Three shall be elected by the School Board of the parish of Ballantrae, one of whom shall be resident in the *quoad sacra* parish of Glenapp;

One shall be elected by the Minister and Kirk-Session of the parish of Ballantrae; and

One shall be the Proprietor of the Estate of Glenapp, or a person to be nominated by him or by his Tutors or Curators, if he be a minor or incapable of acting.

The governors elected by the School Board of Ballantrae shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of five years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governor elected by the Minister and Kirk Session of Ballantrae shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of three years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governors shall, in the case of all elections subsequent to the first, hold office for a period of five years from and after the expiry of the term of office of their predecessors, except as hereinafter provided. Each election shall be made at a meeting convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the electing body. The governors may be elected by the several electing bodies either out of their own number or otherwise. Any governor may be re-elected. The first governors shall be elected as soon as conveniently may be after the date of this Scheme. The clerk or other officer of the governors shall, at least one month before the expiry of the term of office of any governor, give notice to the proper electing body, and the electing body shall, as soon as conveniently may be after such notice, elect a governor to hold office from the expiry of said term. Any election not made as aforesaid within three months from the date of this Scheme, or from the date of the notice of expiry of a term of office, or from the date of the notice of a vacancy, as hereinafter prescribed, shall in that case be made by the then existing governors.

22. Application of Income.—The governors, after paying the necessary expenses of management, and

the burdens and taxes affecting the Endowment, shall apply the free income of the Endowment in the manner hereinafter provided.

23. Free Scholarships at Public Schools.—The governors shall expend a sum not exceeding £15 yearly in paying the fees of poor and deserving children, with books and stationery, at public or State-aided schools in the Parish of Ballantrae, who have passed in the third or higher standards of the Scotch Code, and whose parents or guardians, not being in receipt of parochial relief, are in such circumstances as to require aid in providing elementary education, and are persons who, in the opinion of the governors, should not be required to apply to the Parochial Board for aid in paying school fees. These free scholarships shall be awarded on the result of a competitive examination, or as a reward for regularity of attendance, industry, general merit, and good conduct, all to be ascertained by the report of the teachers and otherwise as the governors may determine. Any payment under this clause shall be withdrawn in the case of children who fail to give regular attendance or make satisfactory progress at school. Not less than £5 of the sum expended annually under this section shall be expended in paying the fees, with books and stationery, of children attending public and State-aided schools in the quoad sacra parish of Glenapp.

24. Payment to School Board for purposes of Higher Instruction.—The governors shall pay the annual sum of £15 to the School Board of Ballantrae, under condition that it shall be applied by the said Board in supplement of the salary of a teacher in the school maintained by them in the quoad sacra parish of Glenapp, and that the sum applied out of the school fund for the salary of the said teacher shall not be less than the whole salary of said teacher at the date of this Scheme. The governors shall satisfy themselves, from time to time, that the said annual payment is applied under the conditions contained herein; and if it appears to them that the said annual payment is not so applied, they shall withdraw the same, and apply it to the purposes of the twenty-sixth section hereof; provided always, that if the said School Board object thereto, the consent of the Scotch Education Department shall be obtained before

the withdrawal of the said annual payment.

25. University or Technical School Bursaries.

The governors shall apply the annual sum of £25 in establishing a bursary for university or technical education, which shall be called the Caddall Bursary. This bursary shall be awarded by competitive examination among those who have been pupils in public or State - aided schools in the parish of Ballantrae, or in the School Board district of Inch, for at least six months before the date of examination; it shall be tenable for such period not exceeding three years, as the governors may determine, at a university or technical school to be approved by the governors. In the event of equality in examination between candidates, a preference shall be given to those resident in the quoad sacra parish of Glenapp.

26. School Bursaries.—The governors shall apply the remainder of the free income in establishing school bursaries to be called the M'Neelie School Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £5 nor more than £10. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided

schools in the parish of Ballantrae, who have passed the fifth standard of the present Scotch Code, or such standard as may from time to time be fixed by the Scotch Education Department pursuant to the Education (Scotland) Acts, as that entitling children to total exemption from the obligation to attend school, and whose parents or guardians are in such circumstances as to require aid for giving them higher education; these bursaries shall be tenable for two years at public or State-aided schools in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches.

27. Forfeiture of Bursaries.-If, in the judgment of the governors, the holder of any bursary shall be guilty of serious misconduct, or fail to make reasonable progress, they may withdraw such bursary, and their determination in such case

shall be final.

28. Annual Distribution of Bursaries. - The governors shall establish the bursaries herein provided for in such manner as to secure that they shall be awarded in as nearly as possible equal

numbers in each year.

29. Residue of Income.—The residue of the free annual income, in so far as it has not been applied under the previsions of this Scheme, shall be invested by the governors as soon as it shall amount to £40 and form part of the capital fund of the Endowment.

30-34. Future Administration. Power to apply to Court of Session for Alteration, to make Bye-laws, and receive Additional Donations.
