FOREIGN OFFICE, July 4, 1884.

HER Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign affairs has received a note from His Excellency the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador respecting the facilities which will be granted to goods sent to the Exhibition which is to be held at Budapesth in 1885. The Austrian and the Hungarian Railway Companies, the Danube Steam Navigation Company, and the 'Advia' Navigation Company will carry such goods at reduced rates. The Austro-Hungarian 'Lloyd' has also made certain alterations in its rates for the same goods, and various Railway Companies in Germany, Holland, France, and Russia have agreed, under certain conditions, to carry back, gratis, any goods not sold at the close of the Exhibition. The Finance Ministry of Hungary has also granted various customs' facilities for foreign goods destined for the Exhibition. The Governments of Germany, Holland, Italy, Belgium, France, and the United States of North America have consented to re-admit free of duty goods which are brought back unsold from the Exhibition in question.

## EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS

(SCOTLAND) ACT, 1882.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Commissioners under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, have prepared the Draft of a Scheme for the future administration of the Endowments known as BOWIE'S MORTIFICATION, SCHOOLMASTER'S GLEBE, and the BROWN MORTIFICATION, in the County of Lanark and Parish of Dolphinton, whereof an abstract is appended. The Commissioners will, in terms of the Twenty-fourth Section of said Act, receive and consider any objection made to them in writing by any public body or persons interested respecting such Scheme, and any amendments proposed thereon, provided that the same be delivered at their Office, at No. 46 George Street, Edinburgh, within two calendar months from the date hereof. Scheme, under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, for the Administration of the Endowments in the Parish of Dolphinton and County of Lanark, known as Bowie's Mortification, hitherto held and administered under Deed of Mortification by John Bowie, dated 4th October 1769, and recorded 13th November 1769; the Schoolmaster's Glebe, presently held and administered under Feu Charter by Richard Mackenzie, dated 15th April 1840; and the annual payment out of the estate of Dolphinton, known as the Brown Mortification, presently administered by the School Board of Dolphinton.

Preamble.

1, 2. Future Administration, Transference of Property.

3. Constitution and Election of Governing Body.—The governing body, hereinafter called the governors, shall consist of five persons, of whom

One shall be the Minister of Dolphinton,

Two shall be elected by the School Board of the Parish of Dolphinton,

One shall be appointed by the Proprietor of the Estate of Dolphinton, or by his tutors or curators, if he be a minor or incapable of acting, and

One shall be elected in rotation by the School Boards of the Parishes of Kirkurd, Dunsyre, and Walston, of whom the Parish of Kirkurd shall make the first election.

The governors may be elected by the several electing bodies, either out of their own number or otherwise. The governors elected by the said School Board of Dolphinton shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of five years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governor elected by the last mentioned School Boards, and the governor appointed by the Proprietor of Dolphinton shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of three years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governors shall, in the case of all elections or appointments subsequent to the first, hold office for a period of five years from and after the expiry of the term of office of their predecessors, except as hereinafter provided. Each election shall be made at a meeting convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the electing body. Any governor may be re-elected or re-appointed. The first governors shall be elected or appointed as soon as conveniently may be after the date of this Scheme. The clerk or other officer of the governors shall, at least one month before the expiry of the term of office of any governor, give notice to the proper electing body, or to the Proprietor of Dolphinton, as the case may be, and the electing body or the Proprietor of Dolphinton shall, as soon as conveniently may be after such notice, appoint or elect a governor to hold office from the expiry of said term. Any election or appointment not made as aforesaid within three months from the date of this Scheme, or from the date of the notice of expiry of a term of office, or from the date of the notice of a vacancy, as hereinafter

prescribed, shall in that case be made by the then existing governors.

4-12. Clauses relating to Vacancies, Meetings, Chairman, Quorum, Accounts, and Minutes.

13-20. Casual Profits, Powers of Sale and Investment, and Transference of Administration.

21. Preservation of Vested Interests.

Application of Income.

22. Application of Income.—The governors, after paying the necessary expenses of management, and the burdens and taxes affecting the Endowment, shall apply the free income of the Endowment in the manner hereinafter provided.

23. Temporary Application of Income.—The governors shall, so long as the Reverend Robert James Stevenson continues to hold the office of parish minister of Dolphinton, apply the income of the Endowment in the manner following:—

(a) They shall continue to pay to the present parish schoolmaster of Dolphinton the annual sums presently paid to him from the revenue of the several foresaid Endowments, on condition that he continue to give free education to the same number of children presently taught gratuitously by him. The children shall be selected by the governors under the conditions and provisions of the twenty-seventh section hereof.

(b) The governors, after deduction of the burdens and expenses of management affecting the estate of Stonypark, and of the sum of £13, 17s. 8½d., shall pay to the said Reverend Robert James Stevenson, present parish minister of Dolphinton, the remainder of the rents of Stonypark, or in the event of the sale of the said estate, they shall pay to the said Reverend Robert James Stevenson the annual average sum which has been paid to him as the surplus rent of the said estate of Stonypark during the currency of the present tack.

(c) They shall apply the remainder of the free income of the Endowment to the purposes of the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth sections hereof.

On the expiry of the vested interest of the said Reverend R. J. Stevenson, the governors shall apply the free income of the Endowment in the manner hereinafter provided, and the said present parish schoolmaster of Dolphinton shall receive the sum hereinafter provided to him in lieu of the interest presently vested in him. In the event of the death or demission of office of the said present parish schoolmaster before the expiry of the vested interest of the said Reverend Robert James Stevenson, the sums to be paid to him under this section shall be applied to the purposes of the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth sections hereof.

24. Annual Payment to the School Board of the Parish of Dolphinton.—The governors shall pay the annual sum of £30 to the School Board of Dolphinton, on condition—

(1) That the School Board shall apply the same for the purposes of higher instruction, by providing a sufficient salary to the head teacher of the parish school of Dolphinton, who shall in the case of any appointment after the date of this Scheme be a graduate of some university in the United Kingdom, and by supplying such assistance as may enable him to

devote his attention chiefly to the upper standards, and to the teaching of specific subjects.

- (2) That the sum applied out of the school fund for payment of salaries in the said school shall be on the same scale as at the date of this Scheme.

The governors shall satisfy themselves from time to time that the said annual payment is applied under the conditions contained herein for the promotion of higher instruction; and, if it appears to them that the said annual payment is not so applied, they shall withdraw the same, provided always that, if the said School Board object thereto, the consent of the Scotch Education Department shall be obtained before the withdrawal of the said annual payment.

25. Application of Annual Payment to School Board in event of Withdrawal.—In the event of the School Board declining to accept the said annual payment under the conditions of the immediately preceding section, or in the event of its being at any time withdrawn under the provisions thereof, the governors shall apply the said surplus income in establishing bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £10 nor more than £15. These bursaries shall be tenable for a period not exceeding three years at such schools for higher education or technical instruction as the governors may approve, and shall be awarded by competitive examination among the pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parishes of Dolphinton, Kirkurd, Walston, Dunsyre, and West Linton, whose age at the date of the competition shall not exceed fourteen years.

26. Free Scholarships at Public Schools.—The governors shall expend a sum not exceeding £10 yearly in paying the fees of poor and deserving children, with books and stationery, at public or State-aided schools in the parish of Dolphinton, who have passed in the third or higher standards of the Scotch Code, and whose parents or guardians, not being in receipt of parochial relief, are in such circumstances as to require aid in providing elementary education, and are persons who, in the opinion of the governors, should not be required to apply to the Parochial Board for aid in paying school fees. These free scholarships shall be awarded on the result of a competitive examination, or as a reward for regularity of attendance, industry, general merit, and good conduct, all to be ascertained by the report of the teachers and otherwise as the governors may determine. Any payment under this clause shall be withdrawn in the case of children who fail to give regular attendance or make satisfactory progress at school.

27. School Bursaries.—The governors shall apply the annual sum of £30 in establishing school bursaries, to be called the Bowie School Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £5 nor more than £10. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending the public or State-aided schools in the parishes of Dolphinton, Kirkurd, Walston, and Dunsyre, who have passed the fifth standard of the present Scotch Code, or such standard as may from time to time be fixed by the Scotch Education Department, pursuant to the Education (Scotland) Acts, as that entitling children to total exemption from the obligation to attend school, and whose parents or guardians are in such

circumstances as to require aid for giving them higher education; these bursaries shall be tenable for two years at public or State-aided schools in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches, or until the holder obtains a higher class bursary. In the event of an equality between candidates for any bursary under this clause, the governors shall give the preference to children attending public or State-aided schools in the parish of Dolphinton.

28. Apprentice Allowances.—The governors may, if they think fit, allow any child who has been successful in the competition for the bursaries established by the immediately preceding section, after holding the bursary for one year at a public or State-aided school, in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches and after passing the sixth standard, to take in lieu of the second year of the said bursary an allowance not exceeding one-half of the amount fixed by the governors as the annual value of the said bursary, on condition that he or she shall be apprenticed to some trade or handicraft, and shall attend evening classes or other course of instruction to be approved by the governors; but not more than £5 annually of the sum applied under the immediately preceding section shall be expended in such allowances. The governors shall obtain a report as to the character and efficiency of the instruction given, and of the attendance and progress of the holder of the allowance.

29. Annual Payment to Parish Minister.—The governors shall pay to the parish minister of Dolphinton, for the time being, the annual sum of £20.

30. Bursaries for Higher or Technical Education.—The governors shall apply the remainder of the free income of the Endowment in establishing bursaries for higher education to be called the Bowie Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £10 nor more than £15. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parishes of Dolphinton, Kirkurd, Walston, and Dunsyre, whose age at the date of the competition shall not exceed fourteen years; they shall be tenable for such period, not exceeding three years, as the governors may determine, at such schools for higher education or technical instruction as they may approve.

31. Forfeiture of Bursaries.—If, in the judgment of the governors, the holder of any bursary shall be guilty of serious misconduct, or fail to make reasonable progress, they may withdraw such bursary, and their determination in such case shall be final.

32. Annual Distribution of Bursaries.—The governors shall establish the bursaries herein provided for, in such manner as to secure that they shall be awarded in as nearly as possible equal numbers in each year.

33. Residue of Income.—The residue of the free annual income, in so far as it has not been applied under the provisions of this Scheme, shall be invested by the governors as soon as it shall amount to £50, and form part of the capital fund of the Endowment.

34–38. Future Administration, Power to apply to Court of Session for Alteration, to make Bye-Laws and Standing Orders, and Receive Additional Donations. Scheme to be Printed.
