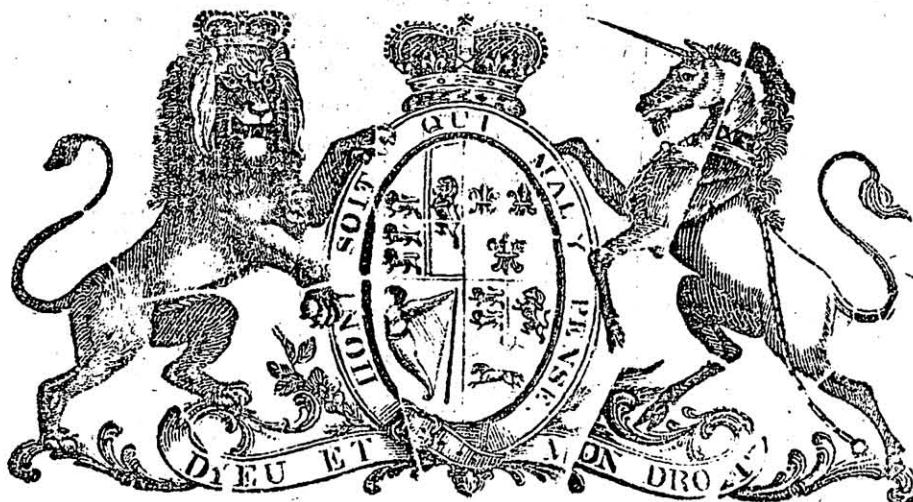

The KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

His Majesty in Council was this day pleased to order the Right Hon. the Lord High Chancellor to issue writs for proroguing the Parliament, which was appointed to meet on Tuesday the 31st day of this instant August, to Tuesday the 5th day of October next; and also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Wednesday the 1st day of September next, to Wednesday the 6th day of October next.
