BY THE KING.—A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R. Whereas our Parliament which we fummoned Whereas our Parliament which we fummoned to meet at Westminster upon Tuesday the thirty-first day of August last, stands prorogued to Tuesday the fifth day of October next; we, with the advice of our Privy Council, do, for divers weighty reasons, hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said fifth day of October next to Tuesday the sixteenth day of November next: And we the fixteenth day of November next: And we have given order to our Chancellor of that part of our united kingdom called Great Britain to prepare a writ patent, under our great feal, for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do further hereby, with the advice aforefaid, declare our royal will and pleafure, that the faid Parliament shall, on the faid fixteenth day of Novemment shall, on the said sixteenth day of November next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said sixteenth day of November next: on the faid fixteenth day of November next: Given at our Court at Windfor the eighteenth

day of September one thousand eight hundred and two, in the forty-fecond year of our reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

TO THE CREDITORS OF JAMES MACKENZIE, Innkeeper in Portpatrick.

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At a general meeting of the creditors of the faid James Mackenzie, held at Portpatrick, on the 24th day of August last, Alexander Mi-Heel, writer in Stranraer, was unanimously elected trustee upon the faid James Mackenzie's sequestrated cleate, and his nomination has been since confirmed by the Lord Ordinary on the bills. Upon the application of the said trustee, the Sherist of Wigton has appointed Tuesday the 28th of September curt. and Thursday the 14th of October next, for the public examination of the bankrupt, and that each day at 12 o'clock noon, within the Ordinary Court-house of Wigton; the trustee farther intimates, that a meeting of the said James Mackenzie's creditors is to be held, at the same place, on Wednesday the 15th day of October next, at 11 o'clock forenoon, for instructing the trustee as to the management and recovery of the citate; and such of the creditors of the faid James Mackenzie as have not already produced, are hereby required to produce, in the trustee's hands, their claims and vouchers or grounds of debt, with their oaths on the verity thereof, at or previous to the said meeting; and the trustee farther intimates, that unless the said productions are made between and the 14th day of May next (being ten mounts after the date of the first deliverance on the petition of sequestration), the party neglecting shall have no share in the first distribution of the debtor's estate.—Of all which this intimation is given in terms of the statute.
