The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Secretary for Scotland has, under the provisions of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, made a representation stating that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor of the Sheriff-Substitute of Fifeshire, finding, on a Petition presented to him by the Provost, Bailies, and Councillors of the Royal Burgh of Burntisland (all the Members presenting the Petition being assessed for the relief of the Poor within the Parish of Burntisland), 'that the Burial Ground which is attached to the Parish Church in the Parish of Burntisland is in a condition which is dangerous, offensive to health, and contrary to decency.'

And whereas in the said representation it is recommended that the said Burial Ground be closed for Burials:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the 17th day of May next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order, or notice thereof, be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies of this Order, or notice thereof, be affixed, as required by the above-mentioned Act, on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places

within, the Parish affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered.
