N.B.—The Knights of the several Orders are to appear in their Collars, it being St. Mark's Day, a Collar Day.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two

clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee, excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

MADAGASCAR CLAIMS.

NOTICE.

FOREIGN OFFICE, March 30, 1887.

The following is a translation of a Note which has been received from the French Minister of Foreign Affairs by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, respecting the manner in which persons,

having claims for losses sustained by them during the war between France and Madagascar, will be allowed to support them before the Indemnity Commission:—

‘ M. L’AMBASSADEUR,

‘ In your Note of the 1st instant your Excellency was good enough to express a desire for information as to the manner in which British subjects, who have suffered losses in Madagascar, will be allowed to support their claims before the Commission charged with the distribution of the indemnity.

‘ I hasten to inform you of the Regulations which the Commission, acting under the authority conferred upon it, has thought fit to draw up for its own guidance in this matter.

‘ It has decided that persons interested may furnish the Commissioner, whose duty it is to report upon their claims with explanations, oral or written, and with such evidence as they may judge proper. The Commission is even prepared to allow them, if a special request to that effect is made, to be heard either in person or by deputy, but only to offer explanations or answer questions. It holds, on the contrary, that no arguments nor pleadings can be allowed before it.’

EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS
(SCOTLAND) ACT, 1882.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Commissioners under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, have prepared the draft of a Scheme for the future administration of the Endowments known as **BALENDOCK MORTIFICATION, DUNCAN MORTIFICATION, FLEMING MORTIFICATION, and ROBERTSON MORTIFICATION**, in the Counties of Perth and Forfar and Parish of Alyth, whereof an abstract is appended. The Commissioners will, in terms of the Twenty-fourth Section of said Act, receive and consider any objection made to them in writing by any public body or persons interested respecting such Scheme, and any amendments proposed thereon, provided that the same be delivered at their Office, at No. 46 George Street, Edinburgh, within two calendar months from the date hereof. Scheme, under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, for the Administration of the Endowments in the Parish of Alyth and Counties of Perth and Forfar, known as the Balendock Mortification, hitherto held and administered under Deed of Mortification by Gilbert Hay, dated 7th January 1805, with Codicil, dated 15th October 1807, both recorded in the Sheriff Court Books of Perth, 6th July 1813; the Duncan Mortification, the Fleming Mortification, and the Robertson Mortification, all presently held and administered by the Minister and Kirk-Session of Alyth.

Preamble.

1, 2. Transference to School Board; Discharge of Governing Body.

3-8. Conduct of Business; Power of Sale and Investment; Casual Profits; Accounts and Audit; Vested Interests.

9. Application of Income.—The governing body, after paying the necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting the Endowment, shall apply the free annual income in the manner hereinafter provided.

10. Bursaries for Higher or Technical Education.—The governing body shall establish one or more bursaries for higher education, to be called the Hay Bursary or Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £10 nor more than £15. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parish of Alyth, whose parents or guardians require aid in giving them higher education, under such conditions and regulations as to age or otherwise as the governing body may determine; they shall be tenable for such period, not exceeding three years, as the governing body may determine, at such schools for higher education or technical instruction as they may approve.

11. School Bursaries.—The governing body shall apply the remainder of the free annual income in establishing school bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £5 nor more than £10. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the parish of Alyth, who have passed the fifth standard of the present Scotch Code, or such standard as may from time to time be fixed by the Scotch Education Department, pursuant to the Education (Scotland) Acts, as that entitling children to total exemption from the obligation to attend school, and whose parents or guardians are in such circumstances as to require aid for giving them higher education; these bursaries shall be tenable for two years at public or State-aided schools in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches.

12. Forfeiture of Bursaries.—If, in the judgment of the governing body, the holder of any bursary shall be guilty of serious misconduct, or fail to make reasonable progress, they may withdraw such bursary, and their determination in such case shall be final.
