dition, and had his Horse wounded under him by a Shot from a Window. With our Prisoners we brought off Two Pieces of Cannon; and, had we had Time to search the Houses, the Number of our Prisoners would have been doubled; but, as Day was coming on, and we might have been cut off from Warbourg, we returned the same Way we came, and arrived there at Eight in the Morning of the 6th, without being at all molested.

We have Accounts, that the Duke of Wirtemberg, with his Troops, is retiring, with great Precipitation, from the Frontiers of Brunswick towards Saxony.

Sir Edward Hawke, by a Letter dated the 5th Instant, gives an Account, that the preceding Day he had sent Lord Howe in the Magnanime, with the Prince Frederick and Bedford, to attack a Fort on the Isle Dumet, which surrendered very soon after the Prince Frederick and Bedford had been placed against it.

There were Nine Cannon of 18 and 22 Pounders found in the Fort, and it was garrifoned by One Company of the Regiment of Bourbon, confifting of Fifty-four Men; of which Two were killed and Six wounded in the Attack.

His Majesty's Ships received no other Hurt, than One Shot through the Bedford's Mizen-Mast.
