uncertain whither they intend to direct their march. The Count d'Estrades, Governor of Macstricht, having commanded the States of the Province of Limburg to repair to Macstricht, to take an Oath of Fidelity to the Most Christian King, those summons have been obeyed, and they have taken the said Oath The Baron de Vierset, late Governor of the Cittadel here, who put the same into the hands of the French, is removed from that command, the King purposing to recompence him with some other employment in France.

Hamburg, July 5. The Letters we receive from Berlin, and other places, all speak, though somewhat confufedly, of a great Victory obtained by the Elector of Brandenburg over the Suedes! They fay, That on the 28 past, the Elector having with him only his Cavalry and Dragoons, his Infantry being still behind, attacked the Sueder near Fehr Berten, where they were drawn up in Battalia, composing eight Brigades of Foot, and feveral Regiments of Horse, and routed them, so that they were forced to retreat, and fave themselves through a narrow passage, and during the Night repaired the Bridges that had been broken down, in order to their passing to the other side of Febr Berlin; That on the part of the Suedes, 2000 were killed upon the place, befides wounded 3 That amongst the killed are several Otficers of Note; as Lieutenant General Wrangel, the Count of Wirtemberg, Colonel Delwyck, Colonel Grothuyfen, &c. That the Brandenburgs had taken one piece of Cannon, eight Colours and three Standards;

That on the part of the Brandenburgs, were killed Major General Morner, Lieutenant Colonel Hen ningh, and other Officers, with about 300 common Soldiers ; and in a Poliscript of a Letter of the 29 from Berlin, it is faid, That the Brandenburgs had taken yet - four pieces of Cannon, four Colours, and all the Enemies Baggage; and by fresher Letters of the fifth instant, we are told, That the Elector he had continued five dayes together in pursuit of the Victory had obtained; andthat befides what is above mentioned, he had talk made To pieces of Cannon, so that all the sued's Afrillery was deltroyed, and 16 Colours; That his Electoral Highnels was at prefent at Mecklenburg, and that the Grand Connellable Wrangel, who had not been in any part of this Action, was retired to Wolgast. These are the parciculars we receive from the Brand nburgs fide, and "now we must expect to hear what account the sue des will give thereof, who, we hear, do not allow the loss on their part to have been by far so considerable anthe Brandenburgs report it

Hagne, July 9. All the discourse at present here is, concerning the news that comes from Hamburg; and those parts, of the deseat of the Suedes by the Elector of Brandenburg, which is variously reported: some betters fay, That his Electoral Highness, after having furprized the Regiment of Colonel Wangelin at Ratelew, pursued his point, and fell upon the Suedes in their several Quarters, before they could get into a Body; but others give us an account, That the Suedes had drawn their Forces together being about 8000 Foot, and 3000 Horse, and that the Elector had engaged them, though having with him only his Cavalry and Dragoons, his infantry being yet behind, as they were drawn up in order of Battalia near Fehr Berlin, and had defeated their near 2000 of the Suedes having been killed upon the place, and between 4 and 500 of the Brandenburgs; That the Suedes had thereupon retreated by means of a narrow passage near Fehr Berlin, and a small River, which having paffed, they broke down the Bridge behind them, leaving several pieces of Cannon, and great part of their Baggage in the hands of the Brandenburge,

who, it is added, the following night repaired the said Bridge, and pursued the Suedes with a great flaughter; taking their remaining Artillery and Baggage; many persons of Eminency among the Suedes are named to be killed and wounded, and it is said that General Wranget (who was not in the Action) was retired with 2000 Horse towards Wismar or Wolgast; but these particulars are as yet related without any certainty, and all that we can at present assured without any certainty, and all that we can at present assured as one of, is, That the Elector of Brandenburg has obtained a very considerable advantage over the Suedes, of which you may expect a true account by our next, We have Letters of the sixth instant from our Army, encamped in the Neighborhood of Aerschot, which say, that it was then about breaking up, but that it was not known whither the murch would be directed.

laris, July 10. Our last Letters stom Monsieur de Turenne's Camp are of the second instant, and tell us, That the Army continued encamped near the lost at Keyl which guards the Bridge of Sin asburg, hindering all communication between the Imperialists and that City; that there had three days before hapned a skir. Ish between them and the Germans; on this occasion, nonsieur de Turenn, having set 300 toot and 200 Horse to guard a Bridge in a village called By bestrein, General Montesucial sent thither 32 Squadions of Horse and two of Dragoons, who forced the French to quit the said Village with the loss of 40 or 50 that were killed, whereupon the Count de Lorge advancing with the grand Guard, the Imperialists retired. We have not any thing of news from the Armies in Flanders, our advices telling us, that the continual Rains have made the ways so deep, that they are almost unpassable for the Cavalry, and much more for the Artillery. The Grand-dut hess of Tuscany is expected here the next week. Here is a report; that Monsieur de Turenne is repassed the Rhine, which we give not any credit to.
