The Confirmation of theſe Hopes, by your Maſteſty's early Declaration in Council of your tender Affection for this your Native Country, demands the moſt grateful Returns from all your Subjects. And we beg Leave to aſſure your Maſteſty, that we ſhall moſt chearfully contribute every Thing in our Power for the Defence of your Maſteſty's Perſon and Government, and in Support of thoſe Meaſures your Maſteſty ſhall judge proper in Proſecution of the preſent juſt and neceſſary War, till you ſhall be able, by the Divine Aſſiſtance, to terminate it by an honourable and laſting Peace.
