The Venus had 4 Men killed, and 18 wounded ; among the latter were Capt. Harrifon, his First Lieu-tenant, and Master; and the Juno 'had 2 Men wounded. The Brune had 19 killed, and 39 wounded.

On the 14th the Venus fell in with the Privatier to which the gave Chace, and upon coming up with her, fhe struck.

All that You want is to have a Bowling-"Green between Arely and Churchill, but You will "never live to fee it. The Parisbioners are bound to " never live to fee it. " curfe the Time that You came into it ; But hoping to bear of fome ill End or other betiding You foon, take
botice of it, and not forget it."
