Lieutenant John Jarvis, who commands His Majesty's Armed Cutter the Hunter, gives an Account, in his Letter dated at Dartmouth the 23d Instant, That in proceeding to Weymouth, he saw a Cutter off the Berry Head, which he gave Chace to; and, after a warm Action of an Hour and Half, she struck, and proved to be the Revenge Privateer of Dieppe, Philip Clouer Dubuifson, Commander, mounting 6 Four Pounders, and 6 Swivel Guns, with 62 Men, two of whom were killed, and five wounded. The Hunter had but one Man slightly wounded.
