Westminster, March 19.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Henry Bellen-den, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Com-mons being come thither accordingly, His Ma-jesty was pleased to give the Royal assent to,

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying cer-tain Vicaries, remaining in the Exchequer, for the Ser-vice of the Year, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-one.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise a certain Sum of Money, towards paying off, and discharging, the Debt of the Navy, and towards Naval Services, for the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-one; and for allowing further Time for making Affi-davits of the Execution of Articles, or Contracts, of Clerks to Attornies, or Solicitors, and filing thereof.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of One Million, for the Uses and Purposes therein mention-ed, and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament, and for exempting any Annuities, or Sums of Money, granted, or to be granted, to the Royal Family, from the Payment of Taxes.

An Act for rendering more effectual the Provisions in an Act made in the Twelfth and Thirteenth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Third, intituled, An Act for the further Limitation of the Crown, and better securing the Rights and Liberties of the Subject, relating to the Commissions and Salaries of Judges.

An Act to continue the Duties for Encouragement of the Coinage of Money.

An Act for applying the Money, granted in this Ses-sion of Parliament, towards defraying the Charge of the Pay of the Militia of that Part of Great Britain called England, when unembodied, and of the Cloathing of the Part of the said Militia now unembodied, for one Year, beginning the 25th Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-one.

An Act for Relief of Insolvent Debtors.

An Act for the better Preservation of the Game, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; and for repealing Part of an Act, passed in the 24th Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for the better Preservation of the Game in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act for repairing the Parish Church of Croydon, in the County of Surrey.

An Act for amending and widening the Road, from the Town of Stone, to Wordsley Green Gate, and from the West End of Bilston-street in Wolverhampton, to the High-street opposite to the Old Bush in Dudley, and from a Place called Burnt Tree near Dudley, to Bir-ningham, and from the Market Cross in Wolverhampton to Cannock, in the Counties of Stafford, Worcester, and Warwick.

An Act for rendering more effectual several Acts passed in the Tenth Year of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, in the Eleventh Year of His late Majesty King George the First, and in the Eleventh Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, for enlarging, amending, and main-taining the Road from Dartford to Northfleet and Gravesend, and from Gravesend to Chalk, and from Northfleet to Chalk, and from thence to the Stones End near the Parish Church of Strood in the County of Kent.

An Act for amending and widening the Roads from the Turnpike Road, upon Gatherley Moor, in the County of York, to Staindrop in the County of Durham, and from the said Turnpike Road near Smallways, across the River Tees, to Winston in the said County of Dur-ham, and for building a Bridge over the said River, at or near Winston Ford.

An Act for repairing and amending the Road leading from Whitecross, in the Parish of Leven in Holderness, in the East Riding of the County of York, to the Town of Beverley in the said County.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Borough of Appleby in the County of Westmorland, through the Township of Orton, to Kirby Kendal, and from Orton to the Turnpike Road near Shapp, and from Highgate, near Tebay, in a Part of the Highway be-tween Appleby and Kirby Kendal, through the Town of Kirby Steven, to the Town of Market Brough in the said County.

An Act for continuing so much of an Act passed in the Thirteenth Year of King George the Second, intituled, An Act for making more effectual two Acts of Parliam-ent passed in the Seventh and Tenth Years of her late Majesty Queen Anne, for preserving and enlarging the Harbour of Whitehaven in the County of Cumberland, and for repairing and amending the High Roads leading to the said Harbour and Town of Whitehaven, as relates to the Preserving and Enlarging of the said Harbour.

And to Twenty-two Private Acts.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I Cannot put an End to this Session, without de-claring My entire Satisfaction in Your Proceedings during the Course of it. The Zeal you have shewn for the Honour of My Crown, as well as for My true Interest, and that of your Country, which are ever the same, is the clearest Demonstration of that Duty and Affection to my Person and Government, of which you so unanimously assured Me at your First Meeting. Nothing could so much add to the Pleasure which these Considerations afford Me, as that I am now able to acquaint you with the great Progress made of late by the Combined Army in Germany, under the Command of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick. I formerly told you, That the Na-ture of the War, in those Parts, had kept the Cam-paign still depending; and it now appears, to the Surprise of my Enemies, that the superior Ability and indefatigable Activity of My General, and the Spirit and Ardour of My Officers and Troops, have greatly profited of this Perseverance, notwithstanding all the Difficulties arising from the Season.

By your Assistance, I have taken the best Care to recruit that Army in an effectual Manner; and have made such a Disposition of My Fleet for the next Summer, as may most advantageously defend My Kingdoms; protect the Commerce of My Subjects; maintain and extend Our Possessions, and Acquisi-tions; and annoy the Enemy.

As in all My Measures I have nothing in View but the Security and Felicity of My Dominions, the Sup-port of My Allies, and the Restoring of the Publick Tranquility, I trust in the Divine Providence, to give a happy Issue to Our farther Operations.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I cannot sufficiently thank you for your Unani-mity, and Dispatch, in providing for the Expences of My Civil Government, and the Honour and Digni-ty of the Crown: And I think Myself as much obliged to you, for the prudent Use, which in fram-ing that Provision, you have made of my Consent

to leave My own Hereditary Revenues to such Disposition of Parliament, as might best conduce to the Utility and Satisfaction of the Publick, as for what more immediately concerns Myself.

In making My Acknowledgements for the large and extensive Supplies which you have granted Me this Session, I am at a Loss whether most to applaud your Chearfulness in giving, or your Wisdom in proportioning them to the extraordinary Occasions of the Publick, notwithstanding those uncommon Burthens, which I heartily regret. No Care shall be wanting, on my Part, to see them duly applied to the National Ends for which you intended them.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Expiration of this Parliament now drawing very near, I will forthwith give the necessary Orders for calling a new one. But I cannot take My Leave of you, without returning My Thanks for the many eminent Proofs you have given of your Fidelity and Affection to My Family and Government, and of your Zeal for this happy and excellent Constitution.

During this Parliament, the Flame of War was kindled by the injurious Encroachments and Usurpations of Our Enemies; and therefore it became just and necessary on Our Part. In the Prosecution of it you have given such Support to My Royal Grandfather and Myself, and such Assistance to Our Allies, as have manifested your Publick-spirited Concern for the Honour of the Nation, and the Maintenance of its undoubted Rights and Possessions, and been attended with glorious Successes, and great Acquisitions, in various Parts of the World; particularly the entire Reduction of Canada, a Conquest of the utmost Importance to the Security of Our Colonies in North America, and to the Extension of the Commerce and Navigation of My Subjects.

May God Almighty grant Continuance to these Successes! The Use which I propose to make of them is, to secure and promote the Welfare of my Kingdoms, and to carry on the War with Vigour, in order to procure to them the Blessings of Peace, on safe and honourable Conditions for Me and My Allies; so which I have been always ready to hearken.

Firm in these Resolutions, I do, with entire Confidence, rely on the good Dispositions of my faithful Subjects in the Choice of their Representatives; and I make no Doubt but they will thereby demonstrate the Sincerity of those Assurances, which have been so cordially and universally given Me, in the loyal, affectionate, and unanimous Addresses of My People.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His MAJESTY's Command, said;

WH E R E A S We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of April next. We do for that End publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said Seventh Day of April next. And We being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, That, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have this Day given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain, to issue out Writs in due Form, for calling a new Parliament; which Writs are to bear Teste on Saturday the Twenty-first Day of this Instant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Nineteenth Day of May next.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
In Order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

WH E R E A S We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tuesday the Nineteenth Day of May next ensuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament; We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Fifth Day of May next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the said Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Disorders, and Violence whatsoever. And we strictly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time

hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers, to proceed to such Election.

Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure for Continuing Officers, not already removed or discharged, in Great-Britain, Ireland, and the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the sixth Year of the Reign of our late Royal Predecessor Queen Anne (intituled, An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great-Britain in the Protestant Line) it was enacted (amongst other Things) That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great-Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, should become void by Reason of the Demise of Her said late Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that all and every Person and Persons, in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments for the Space of six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed or discharged by the next in Succession, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to remain and descend: And in Regard that the Space of Six Months from the Time of the Demise of Our Royal Grandfather, of Glorious Memory, hath been found not sufficient for passing and compleating new Grants, Commissions and Appointments, for all the said Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might happen by the same becoming void, out of Our Royal Wisdom and Care of the State (referring to our Judgment hereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Misbehaviours or Abuses, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) are pleased, and do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the Demise of our said Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within our Kingdoms of Great-Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, and have not since been removed or discharged from such their Offices, Places, or Employments, shall be, and shall be adjudged and taken to be, continued in, and hold and execute, such their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in like Manner, as at the Time of the Demise of our said Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the same, for the Space of Four Months from the Date hereof, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And in the mean Time, for the Preservation of the Peace, and necessary Proceedings in Matters of Justice, and for the Safety and Welfare of the State, We do hereby strictly Command all the said Persons, of whatsoever Degree or Condition, That they do not fail, every one severally, according to his Place, Office, and Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties thereunto belonging, as formerly appertained unto them, and every of them, while Our said Royal Grandfather was living. And

further, We do hereby Will and Command all and singular Our loving Subjects, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be aiding and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers, in the Performance and Execution of the said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their Perils.

Hague, March 17. The Letters from the Army under Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, of the 8th Instant, inform us, that his Serene Highness's Quarters continued at Schweinsberg. We have received by them, a Confirmation of the News of the Sally, that was made on the 7th Instant by the Garrison at Cassel; in which the French took Possession of the Trenches, and carried off four Mortars, and nailed up one Piece of Cannon, and destroyed the Works of the Grand Battery. But Count La Lippe, at the Head of the Hessian Guards, and Wangenheim's Grenadiers, drove them back into the Town.

Our last Accounts from the French Army of the 12th Instant mention, that Marshal Broglio had moved his Head Quarters from Bergen to Friedberg; and that the greatest Part of the Reinforcement expected by him from the Lower Rhine, was arrived upon the Meyn.

By Letters of the 11th from Leipzig, every Thing was quiet in those Parts. The King of Prussia, it was expected, would soon visit the Posts of Chemnitz and Freyberg, and afterwards fix his Quarters at Meinen. General Sibourg, with the Corps under his Command, was returned to his Quarters of Cantonments.
