May it pleafe your Majesty,

W E your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, as we heartily approve the Conduct of the Commission of the late Assembly, in congratulating your Majesty's auspicious Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors; so we embrace with Pleasure, this first Opportunity which our Meeting together in a National Astembly affords us, of exprefling our own Joy on Account of an Event fo

happy for Great Britain. The many Bleffings which we had enjoyed, during fo long a Tract of Time, under the mild and paternal Government of your Royal Grandfather, gave us the highest Reason to join in that deep and univerfal Sorrow, which filled the Nation on His Death. The Memory of fo Juft and Gracious a Sovereign, whofe Counfels and Arms were fo rewarkably bletted by the Almighty, as it must long remain ingraved on our Hearts, cannot fail to endear to us the more, every Defcendant of His Illustrious Family.
