The humble Address of the Lieutenant Governour and Council of the Province of Georgia.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant Governour and Council of your Majesty's Province of Georgia, though by our Distance prevented the Happiness of approaching your Sacred Person, yet deeply affected with the most unfeigned Concern, humbly beg Leave to condole with your Majesty on the Death of your Royal Grandfather, our late most gracious Sovereign; whose Justice and Mercy were equal to the Lustre of his Arms, and Dignity of his Crown. So sensible a Loss could only be alleviated by your Majesty's immediate and happy Accession to the Throne; as from a Prince so eminently possessed of every Royal Virtue, we promise ourselves the Continuance of the greatest Blessings.

Permit us therefore, most gracious Sovereign, to mingle our very sincere and affectionate Congratulations with those of your Majesty's other faithful Subjects, on this great and important Event: And also to assure your Majesty, that the Inhabitants of this Province are zealous and united in their Attachment to your Royal Person and Government. It is their earnest Prayer, that your Majesty may long continue to reign over a grateful and happy People; that you may long continue the Arbitrator of Europe, and the sure Refuge of oppressed Nations; and that your People, to their latest Posterity, may be ever blessed with a Prince of your illustrious House, endowed with your Majesty's most amiable Virtues and Accomplishments.

In the Council Chamber Savannah in Georgia, February 11, 1761.

Hague, June 5. It is said that the Cavalry of the French King's Household have Orders to be in Readiness to march, between the 6th and 10th Instant, to the Lower Rhine; that four Regiments of Horse or Dragoons, being attacked with the Glanders, were ordered back from thence for France; and that Marshal Broglie being to set out from Frankfurt on the 12th, it was expected that his Army would begin its Operations soon after. General Sporken took Possession of the Camp at Warbourn on the 30th past; and on the same Day the Hereditary Prince began to encamp at Notteln and Shaapdetten. A Skirmish has happened near Cassel, in which the Hussars of the Allied Army had taken a Lieutenant, and some Hussars of the Enemy.

Hanover, May 29. Captain Lieutenant Neimeier, with one Hundred Horse of the Regiment of Chevalerie, being ordered by Colonel Lukener to occupy the Environs of Northeym, he was very near taking M. de Belfunce; but the Swiftness of his English Horse saved him. A Lieutenant Colonel, 34 Dragoons, and 40 Horse, fell however into his Hands.

On the Receipt of this good and Tell Hemsted Pickett and Milieway and all the Rest of your Heaverill Gang of the Bandity that so Vilinously oppoofe the Gospell being Preeched that if we meet with any more affronts or abuse when we Come again as we Intend to Doo on the 17th Instant we are Resolved to Reveng itt on your Passions or Houses for as wee have lifted under the Baner of Christ our Captain we are on and all deturmin'd to stand by on another our Number is Larg and our Caus good therefor we fecit all your Mallis att Defians Dont say You had no Notis or worning for Wee are so prepa'd that we fear you not therefor tak Care what you doo I am order'd by my Brethren in the Lord to Sighne for the Rest your Friendly Moneter five Hundred or the Gospel Legion"

His late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and War-rani Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Charles Fearnie, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governours of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May Instant; This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of this Instant, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
