Captain King, of His Majesty's Ship the Argo, gives an Account, in his Letter dated at the Nore, the 17th Instant, of his Arrival there, with the Marechal Duc de Biron Snow, a French Privateer of 15 Guns, Six-Pounders (pierced for 20) 12 Swivels, and 109 Men, which was taken by the Argo,

on the 11th Instant, after a Chace of eight Hours. The said Privateer failed from Dunkirk the 7th of January last, on a Cruize to the Westward, and her Cruize being expired, was returning to Dunkirk, having on board the Ransomers named in the following List.
