The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

This Day his Grace Thomas Holles Duke of Newca'lle took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, as Lord Lieutenant of the Counties and Towns following, viz.

County of Middlefex, and City and Liberty of Westminster.

County of Nottingham, and Town of Nottingham and County of the fame. And, County of Suffex.

St. James's, July 15. This Day the following Address of the Lieutenant Governor, and the Upper House of Affembly, in the Province of Maryland, was prefented to His Majefly by the Right Honourable Lord Baltimore, Lord Proprietary of the faid Province, being intro-duced by the Lord of His Majefly's Bed Chamber in Waiting : Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciouliy.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lieutenant-Governor, and the Upper House of Assembly, in the Province of Maryland.

EEPLY affected with the fevere Lois we, in common with our Fellow-Subjects, have fultained by the Death of our late most Excellent King, of happy Memory, whole paternal Care the Inha-bitants of these Colonies have, in the amplest Manner, experienced in the Courfe of His long, mild, just, and glorious Reign; favourably permit us, most Gracious Sovereign, to condole with your Majefty that melancholy Event : But we should not approve ourselves in any Respect worthy of the indulgent Protection of Providence, did we not derive and moft thankfully acknowledge the ftrongeft Confolation, from a Contemplation on the Eminent and Royal Virtues, which constitute and embellish the Character of a good King; and give the beft of furance of a Continuance, under your Majethy' Reign, of the invaluable Bleffings we have fo long enjoyed during that of your Illustrious Grandfather. With this Aflurance, we join in the general Joy which hath been diffused through all the extensive Dominions of Great Britain ; and, with the greatest Humility and pureft Sincerity of Heart, beg Leave to congratulate your Majefty upon your Acceffion to the Throne of your Anceftors.

May your Majesty be rendered happy by the Prosperity of a Free People, flourishing under the benign Influence of your auspicious Government; by a grateful and adequate Retribution in their zealous Affection, and firm Attachment to your Sacred Perfon, and by every Solace of human Na-ture ; and we most fervently pray, that your Ma-jesty's Reign may be diffinguished as well by its Length as its Felicity.
