His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Chancellor of the University, accompanied by the Vice Chancellor, and the other Members of the University, who before waited on their Majesties, were introduced to her Royal Highness by the Right Honourable Lord Boston, Chamberlain to her Royal Highness; when his Grace the Duke of Newcastle made the Compliments of the University in the following Speech.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

**T**HE University of Cambridge begs Leave to approach your Royal Highness, with their most sincere Congratulations upon the happy Nuptials of their most Gracious Sovereign, with a Princess so eminent for her Personal Virtues, and Endowments; and descended from an Illustrious House, always zealous for the Protestant Religion.

May your Royal Highness long live, to see a numerous Progeny arise from this Happy Alliance; who, emulating the Virtues of their Royal Parents, shall also place their chief Glory in the Protection of our Holy Religion; the Encouragement of useful Learning; and the Support of the just Rights of a Free, and Loyal, People.

Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager's Answer.

*Passau, Aug. 30.* Cardinal Lamberg, Bishop of this City, died here this Day in the 81st Year of his Age, by which there are eleven vacant Hats in the College of Cardinals.

*Hamburg, Sept. 4.* According to a Letter of the 28th past, received here Yesterday from Glogau, the King of Prussia was expecting every Day to be attacked by the united Forces of Austria and Russia.

We hear from Saxony, that the Body detached by Prince Henry of Prussia, to oppose the Progress of the Swedish Army in Pomerania, consisted of 4000 Men; and that his Royal Highness had sent likewise 1000 Men to garrison the Town of Wolfenbuttel.

*Dusseldorff, Sept. 8.* The taking of Dorsten has determined the Prince of Soubise to retire towards Wesel, after having detached M. Vogué, with a large Body, to oblige the Allies to quit Dorsten. The French Army marched the 4th to Holterhausen, and passed the Lippe the 5th, on three Bridges, near Dorsten; and the same Evening the Army encamped at Westerboit.

*Hague, Sept. 11.* By Letters from the Army under the Command of Prince Ferdinand, we have an Account, that, his Serene Highness repass'd the Dymel, and occupied pretty near the same Position which he possessed last Year, after the Affair of Warburg.

Letters from the Lower Rhine confirm the taking of the Post of Dorsten, with the Battalion of Vierzetinit. They add, that the Hereditary Prince had his Quarters, on the 6th, at Dulmen, and that he had obliged the Prince of Soubise to pass the Lippe.

Letters from Magdeburg of the 5th, say, that, by the last Accounts from Silesia, which were of the 30th, his Prussian Majesty was still at Bantzelwitz: The Austrians had quitted the Heights of Kuntzen-dorff, and had taken Post nearer to the Prussian Army; and at the same Time the Russians had made a Motion to their Left, in order to approach the Austrians. From these Movements it was concluded, that they intended to attack his Prussian Majesty in his Intrenchments.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth of this Instant, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of this Instant, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited by the said Proclamation, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Twelfth Day of this Instant September, to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

**I**Nformation having been received at this Board, that divers Hackney Coachmen and Chairmen have entered into a Combination not to work their Coaches and Chairs on the Day of their Majesties Coronation, without exorbitant Rates for their Hire: It is this Day ordered by their Lordships, that the Commissioners for licensing Hackney Coaches and Chairs do publish an Advertisement, requiring all Hackney Coachmen and Chairmen to be out with their Coaches and Chairs (having their Figures placed in the usual Manner) by Four of the Clock in the Morning of the said Day, in the most convenient Stations; and that, unless they shall produce proper Proofs, when required, of their having faithfully discharged their Duty, without making any exorbitant Demands, they will be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
