The humble Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum, in Common Council assembled.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum, beg Leave, with all Humility and Reverence, to approach your sacred Person with our unfeigned Congratulations on your happy Marriage, with an excellent Princess of the illustrious House of Mecklenburgh Streliz, whose distinguished Character and amiable Qualities conspire to form the greatest Queen and most engaging Consort for the best of Kings.

We cannot enough admire, and therefore with the deepest Sense of Gratitude acknowledge, your Majesty's Wisdom and Prudence, in this great and important Event, as it is not only a convincing Proof of your Care and Concern for the Protestant Religion, and the present and future Happiness and Security of your People, but a glorious Example to animate your Subjects to value and countenance the matrimonial State.
