Moſt gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's moſt dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesſes of Beverley in the County of York, with great Humility beg Leave to expreſs our moſt ſincere Congratulations on the Solemnization of your Royal Nuptials; an Event of ſo great Felicity to your Majesty and the whole Nation.
