Erggage ; but after some skirmish, were beaten back into the Town. All the particulars we have of the Fight, is, That the Confederates having the 11 inftant, paffed the Saar, the Foot over a Stone-bridge called Congerbrugg, and the Horfe having forded through, they came upon Marefchal de Crequi very unexpectedly, who, however, as well as the time would permit, drew up his Ar-my, and posted it the most advantagiously he could, not having above 8 or 9000 Men; the Confederates, who were almost double the number, begun to attack them about Noon, and the Fight continued three hours, when the French Hoife gave ground, and as well Horfe as Foot were broken, and fell into confusion ; most of the Foot were killed, for it's faid the Germans gave no quarter ; and some of the Horse, but the greatest part fled to Metz, Thionville, &c. their Baggage, and eight or ten pieces of Cannon, were taken : the Chevaliers de Sourdie and de la Trousse, who commanded next to Grequi the Cavalry, the fon of the Mareschal de Grancey, and a Colonel of Dragoons, were made Prisoners. The Confederates, after having gained this Victory, returned to the Siege, where the 13 inftant, the Batteries, on which are planted above 30 pieces of Cannon, were finished. We are told, that there is a very strong Garifon within the place, and that they are refolved to make a brave defence; and on the other fide, the Confederates pretend they will not grant them other conditions than to be Prisoners at War,

Aix la Chapelle, Aug. 16. Two thousand Horse, Four hundred Dragoons, and Two hundred Foot, of the Garison of Maestricht, are come into the Countrey of Cornelia Munster, with design, probably, to make a diversion on that side.

Bruffels, Aug. 20. On Saturday laft, a French party of Charleroy, cut off above 200 of our Foragers ; and two dayes before, the Baron de Quincey had cut off a French Convoy between Aeth and Tournay. The Prince of Orange continues fill with his Army near Hall, but it is every day expected that he will decamp ; his Highnefs, to amufe the Enemy, has caufed three feveral grounds to be viewed, as though intended for his next encimpment; one near Ninove, another at Grammoni, and the third at Nivelle. And yesterday in the evening, orders were given out for the Army to march this morning, but about midnight they were countermanded, and directions given to be only in a present readiness to march. In the mean time the Duke of Luxemburgh, now called the Mareschal de Montmorency, remains beeween Aeth and Cambron Abby, though it be faid that he hath lately fent feveral Troops to reiuforce the Neighbouring Garifons, not knowing what his Highness defigns; and it is added, that he has likewife fent 3000 Horse towards Germany. Treves still holds out ; it is certain the Mareschal de Crequi is there : the Confederates have above 30 pieces of Cannon on Batteries against the place, and hoped to be Masters of it before this day.

Oftend, Aug. 21. Yefterday, at five a Clock in the merning, a purty of 350 Frenck, both Horfe and Foot, of the Gatifon of *Courtray*, appeared within a League of this place, on the River or Canal that paffes from *Plashendal* to Nemyart, having brought with them two large flat bottemed Boats on Waggons, by which means they paft the faid River, and came to a Village called Leffing, which they fet on fire, and burnt to the ground, and foreturned, taking away with them many Horfes, and fome Priforers. It is faid that the Admiral thip of the Capers of this place, is accidently blown up, and that \$25 Men perified in it. Briel, Aug. 18. We have little to advife from hence? exc p that Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter is put to Sea with 25 Men of War, directing his Courte to the Southward from the Maele. Here now lies before this Town three Men of War, and a Dogger, fitted out for the fervice of the Elector of Brandenburgh.

Hagne, Mug. 18. The great news we have at prefert, is the defeat of the Marefehal de Crequi, which we receive from B: uffels; we hope our next Letters will give us an account of the furrender of Treves, which can now hardly expect to be fuccosred. We are told that the Heer Rabenhaup is lately dead at Corvoerden. We have advice from Italy, That the Duke de Vivonne's defign was upon young de Ruyter, who he underflood to be on his way with feveral rich Merchantmen towards the Levant; but that he having changed his courfe, the Duke had miffed him, and was returned with the French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies to Meffina, of which we expect a confirmation.

Ditto, Ang. 20, At Amfterdam they have advice of fix Eaft India Men, homeward bound, being upon the Coafts; and, it's faid, that one or two of them are already arrived in the Texel. We have not any thing of news from our Army in Flanders.

Lime, Aug. 11. By a Veffet arrived here in fix weeks from the Barbadoes, we have advice of a Confpiracy that had been diffeovered among the Blacks there, to defroy the English 3 and that it had been formed and carried on with great feerfie, till the very time intended for the execution, which had been begun by the Blacks belonging to one Capt. Swaneley, who was killed by them; feveral of the Blacks had been already exemplarily punifhed, and a farther fearch was making the whole Illand over, for the perfecting the diffeovery of the whole matter.

matter, London, Ang, 12. By a Veffel arrived from New-England, we have an account of the rifing of fome of the Indians, with defign to fall upon the English; that they had already killed feveral, and burnt and plundered their Houses and Plantations z upon which, the Bostomers, and they of *Plymouth*, had fee oue feveral hundred armed Men to putfue the Indians, who skulked here and there, but durft not appear in any confiderable Bodies.
