The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Lord Lieutenant, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Hertford.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, always ready to embrace every Opportunity of acknowledging our unfeigned Thanks for your Majesty's mild, wife and paternal Care of all your Subjects, since the Commencement of your Majesty's Reign; a Period, which as it reflects Honour on the British Annals, for the many signal Conquests obtained by your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, will not be less memorable for having blessed these Kingdoms with a Prince of your Majesty's known Virtues and Accomplishments, which can only be exceeded by the Love you bear your People, a late Instance of which, we have experienced in your Majesty's happy Nuptials with so illustrious and amiable a Consort, as our most gracious Queen Charlotte, a Princess, whose personal Endowments, as well as illustrious Birth, add Dignity to the most exalted Station. And may the Almighty, by whom Kings reign, bless your Majesties with a long and happy Reign, graced with an illustrious Offspring, emulous of their Parents Virtues; and that our Religion and Liberties may be supported by a Succession of Princes of your Royal Line, to the remotest Ages, shall ever be our most ardent Prayer.

Frankfort, Nov. 19. The French Troops have suffered lately very much by Desertion, as well as by Sickness and bad Weather, infomuch that the Battalions, one with another, do not amount to Three Hundred Men, and we hardly see a Squadron of Eighty Men.

Cologne, Nov. 20. Our Garrison consists of nine Battalions, viz. Alsace 4, Roial Suedois 3, Orleans 2. Since the Departure of M. d'Andlau, M. de Montazet has taken the Command till the Arrival of M. d'Auvert who is appointed Commandant of this City.

Liege, Nov. 21. The last four Squadrons of the Gendarmerie arrived here the 18th, in their Way to the Winter Quarters assigned them between the Sambre and the Maese; they did not make near so good an Appearance as the first, their Numbers being greatly diminished, no less than five hundred Men having quitted the Service since the Finishing of the Campaign; on being refused Leave to return to Paris, after a Campaign in which they have greatly suffered for Want of Forage and Provisions. A Regiment of French Cavalry, has taken its Winter Quarters at Stavelo and Malmedi, being quite ruined. Roial Roussillon are placed at Bilsen and Houffel in this State. The 19th la Rochefaucault Cavalry passed here, returning to France by Huy and Givet. This Day Talleyrand marched into our Fauxbourgs, in their Way to Huy, where they remain this Winter.

Hambourg, Nov. 20. Count Goes, the Imperial Minister at the Court of Sweden, arrived here Yesterday, on his Return to Vienna, the Emperor having appointed him Preceptor to the young Archduke Joseph.

Admiralty Office, November 30.

Captain Charles Douglas, of His Majesty's Ship the Syren, gives an Account, in his Letter dated in Dover Road the 27th Instant, that the said Ship, in Company with the Unicorn and Martin Sloop, the Morning before, at Break of Day, between the Coast of Flanders and the Galloper, fell in with, chased, and took, the Ernestine Cutter Privateer, of and from Dunkirk, carrying Ten 4 Pounder Guns, and 67 Men; and that it was her first Cruize, and she had not taken any Thing.
