The KIN G's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS His Majefty was gracioully pleafed by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July laft, to promife and declare, (amongft other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhould, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieute-nants of His Majefty's Ships; or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy : And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings (hould be paid to every able bodied Landman nor above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of I wenty Years, who should, on or before the faid T welfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majelty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, fhould be paid to any Perfon who fhould difcover any Sea-man or Seamen who fhould fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's faid Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Twelfth Day of this Infant December; And it being judged ex-pedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame fhould be continued for fome longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly or-dered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the faid Twelfth Day of this Inftant Decem-ber, to the Thirty First Day of January next inclu-five. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

The same Advices add, that the Prince of Wurtenberg is at prefent near Shifelbein on the other Side of the River Rega; and that the Generals Platen and Schenkendorff were on their March to join his Highness, in order to attack and force General Romanzow to raife the Siege of Col-berg; and that the Ruffians began to be in great Want both of Provisions and Forage.
